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A widow in that city kept after him: 'My rights are being violated. Protect me!' (Luke 18:3 MES)

Today, we are experiencing injustice through not only an attempt for voter suppression, but police brutality, detention and mass incarceration. In the U.S. and around the world, communities whose health, water, air and 6 land are threatened by corporate greed, voices for justice are often curbed through extreme violence, intimidation 7 and murder. In a year where the inequalities of justice and community recovery have once again shown how 8 much needs to be done to produce equality to all areas of South Carolina.

In this country, communities of color are under siege: named and unnamed black lives are killed each year by 10 police; immigrants are detained and scapegoated; and public displays of discontent and calls for solidarity have too 11 often been met with disregard, suppression or violence. As Christians, United Methodist, Wesleyans we believe 12 that leaders and policy makers are called to act and to govern in fairness and with justice for all! Like the persistent 13 widow who demands that the judge hear her plea (Luke 18:1-8), we will bring our petitions for justice to Annual 14 Conference and the Church State of South Carolina. Like the persistent widow, we will not be silenced.

This year the work of advocacy has never been clearer yet much of the energy has been washed away. Through 16 prayer, worship, advocacy training, networking and mobilization with other Christians, we have faced the reality of 17 racism, class and power impacting politics and policies and advocate for persons all around South Carolina and our 18 churches. Two Wednesday evenings before the killings at Mother Emanuel along with hundreds of Wesleyan 19 tradition folks, Members of the Advocacy Ministry Area participated in a powerful mass prayer service in North 20 Charleston called by the Bishops of the AME, AMEZ, CME, and UMC. The Reverend Clementa Pinckney, our friend, 21 led that service. I can hear his deep, gentle voice as he asked with great compassion those among us who had 22 suffered from violence in their families to stand. Now we stand with his family and the families and loved ones of eight 23 more to say we must find a way to the Light, we must work to end the darkness of violence among us and around the 24 world. We must further the work of racial reconciliation and the vital conversations on race we are having.

We have continued to work with South Carolina Christian Action Council SCCAC. As United Methodist we 26 supported the removal of the Confederate flag. The Rev. Kathy James, UMC Board representative volunteered 27 to have a press release prepared based on the Council's statements on the removal of the Confederate Flag. 28 Many Members of the Advocacy Team with in their partnership with the SCCAC the multiple services around the 29 state to bring healing to our communities and neighborhoods. We worked with the Christian Action Council in 30 partnership with SC Appleseed Center for Legal Justice, SC AARP and other organizations and individuals, the 31 Council continues to advocate legislation regulating predatory lending practices in SC. Legislation. We have also 32 been working with The South Carolina Christian Action Council to advocate for legislation to bring the Federal 33 dollars of the Affordable Care Act to SC. The Board of the South Carolina Christian Action Council has taken a 34 position to support advocacy for legislation to make stronger the law and regulation requiring background checks for 35 the purchasing of guns. The Council is in the work of listening and working together to develop a policy statement. 36

The South Carolina Advocacy ministry team Committee also participated with End Racism Day officially observed 37 since 1966 by the United Nations as The International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination. The CMA is 38 excited to partner with the South Carolina Human Affairs Commission, which is taking the lead to promote End Racism 39 Day for the first time in our state. An Advocacy Training For Clergy and Faith-Inspired Folk hosted by Bethlehem 40 Baptist Church, 1028 Eastman Street, Columbia, SC 29203 the first Tuesday after Holy week as we learned together 41 and encourage each other in the holy work of advocating for justice! Members also have been actively engaging in the 42 online Vital Conversations Webinars by The General Commission on Race and Religion of the United Methodist 43 Church (GCORR) presents Vital Conversations 2 featuring thought leaders, pastors, theologians, activists, authors, 44 and scholars from outside of the United States who share their stories, insights, and expertise on issues related to faith, 45 culture, and fighting oppression in the church and world today. Lastly we also had members to participated in EAD 46 Ecumenical Advocacy Days is a movement of the ecumenical Christian community, and its recognized partners and 47 allies, grounded in biblical witness and our shared traditions of justice, peace and the integrity of creation.

RRDT Report

The tragic events across our state and nation in the last year combined with the current political climate 51 evince the need for an ongoing, intentional, and faithful Christian witness in light of the racial dynamics of our 52 state, nation, and world. Although the Racial Reconciliation Task Force did not sponsor an event for the Annual 53 Conference this year, we are encouraged by the number of Districts who have begun intentional interracial 54 conversations and relationships in their local communities. At its core, reconciliation is incarnational work as we 55 live out a new racial reality with our neighbors, especially those from whom we are segregated. In the year 56 ahead, the Racial Reconciliation Task Force will seek to organize itself to be in conversation with, and where 57 appropriate, act as consultants to the District conversations of race. We are excited that members of our team 58 will facilitate a panel discussion and table conversations on race in the Columbia District in April. We will also 59 seek to organize another pilgrimage event for the Annual Conference to both engender and benefit from 60 conversations about race and reconciliation in the various districts. We will meet as a task force in April to 61 organize ourselves for both endeavors.

THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STANDING RULES

The Committee on Standing Rules met in March of 2016 to consider requests to amend existing standing rules or proposed new standing rules. This year the committee received five such requests. As a result, the Committee on Standing Rules offers to the Annual Conference for its consideration amendments to the following standing rules: 28, 53, 54, 70 and 71.

Standing Rule 28 addresses the clergy election process of General Conference Delegates.

Rationale: The proposed changes to SR28 would provide a method for allowing those clergy interested in being considered for election to General and Jurisdictional Conference to be listed on a "clergy ballot". While not excluding any eligible person, this would mean that clergy would have to "opt in" to being nominated as delegates for General Conference

Standing Rule 28 (Existing)

- 28. The following system of nomination and selection shall be followed in the election of clergy delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences:
 - a. The Conference Secretary shall inform all eligible clergy members of their eligibility (pursuant to the provisions of *The Book of Discipline*) by November 1 of the year preceding the election of delegates. Clergy delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences shall be elected from the ordained ministerial members in full connection, (2008 *Book of Discipline* ¶35) except for clergy on Involuntary Leave of Absence (¶355).
 - b. All eligible clergy members shall be listed on the ballot prepared by the Secretary of the Annual Conference, except clergy members that request in writing that their name be omitted from the ballot. Clergy members requesting omission from the ballot do not lose eligibility for election. Clergy receiving twelve or more write-in votes on any ballot shall be assigned a number and added to the ballot.
 - c. All clergy who allow their names to be printed on the ballot have expressed their willingness to be a nominee, to attend and participate in the conferences if elected, and to attend meetings of the delegation.

Proposed Standing Rule 28

- 28. The following system of nomination and selection shall be followed in the election of clergy delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences:
 - a. The Conference Secretary shall inform all eligible clergy members of their eligibility (pursuant to the provisions of The *Book of Discipline*) by November 1 of the year preceding the election of delegates. Clergy delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences shall be elected from the ordained ministerial members in full connection, (2008 2012 Book of Discipline ¶35) except for clergy on Involuntary Leave of Absence (¶355). The Conference Secretary shall advise eligible clergy member who are interested in being considered for election to the General and Jurisdictional Conference of their right to be listed on the clergy ballot by self-nomination or nomination by another eligible clergy member and shall provide a form for such nominations. Such forms are to be returned to the Conference Secretary by no later than February 1 in the year preceding the election of delegates.
 - b. All <u>eligible</u> clergy members <u>nominated through the process outlined in a., above</u> shall be listed on the clergy ballot prepared by the Secretary of the Annual Conference, except clergy members that request in writing that their name be omitted from the ballot. Clergy members requesting omission from the ballot do not lose eligibility for election. clergy <u>members otherwise eligible</u> receiving twelve or more write-in votes on any ballot <u>during the election process</u> shall be assigned a number and added to the <u>clergy ballot</u>.
 - c. All <u>eligible</u> clergy who allow their names to be printed on the <u>clergy</u> ballot <u>shall</u> have expressed their willingness <u>in writing</u> to be a nominee, to attend and participate in the conferences if elected, and to attend meetings of the delegation.

Standing Rule 53 addresses the composition and election of the Board of Trustees of Claflin University.

<u>Rationale:</u> The proposed changes would clarify that Claflin University will nominate its own trustees and the SCUMC and BHECM "approve the trustees" for election.

Standing Rule 53 (Existing)

- 53. There shall be a Board of Trustees of Claflin University composed of not less than nine (9) nor more than twenty-seven (27) members divided into three classes serving three years respectively, elected at the annual meeting of the Board, in accordance with the Claflin University Board of Trustees by-laws. Successors for each class, as their term expires, shall be nominated by a university related agency and/or the Nominating Committee of the Board of Trustees and elected by the Board of Trustees for a term of three (3) years. After twelve (12) years of continuous service, trustees may be placed in a class of Trustee Emeritus.
 - a. The Trustees shall elect their successors from a list of nominees submitted by the South Carolina Annual Conference Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry and the Claflin University General Alumni Association. The composition of the Board shall at all times include three (3) members from the South

Carolina Annual Conference and with one representative of the Conference to be placed in each class 1 and shall be replaced or re-nominated by the South Carolina Annual Conference upon the expiration of 2 each succeeding class. The remaining membership of the Claflin Board of Trustees shall be elected by 3 the Board from nominations made to and approved by the Nominating Committee of the Board from 4 recommendations received from the General Alumni Association and other college related Conferences 5

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b. This institution shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

Proposed Standing Rule 53

53. The Board of Trustees at Claflin University will consist of no fewer than thirteen (13) members and no more than twenty-seven (27) members. Newly elected trustees serve for a term of three (3) years or elected to serve out a remaining term due to a vacancy on the Board.

The Board shall elect three (3) of their members from the South Carolina United Methodist Conference 15 (SCUMC) upon the expiration of a term in which its nominees were placed.

- a. The composition of the Board will include three (3) members (lay or clergy) from the South Carolina 18 Annual Conference (SCUMC). These representatives (lay or clergy) will be distributed in separate classes 19 among the three classes and may be approved for election by the South Carolina Annual Conference 20 (SCUMC) upon the expiration of each succeeding class. These three (3) persons will be proposed as 21 candidates by the Claflin University Board of Trustees, vetted and approved by the Board of Higher 22 Education and Campus Ministry, approved for election by the South Carolina Annual Conference 23 (SCUMC), and elected by the Claflin University Board of Trustees. These elected trustees are eligible to 24 serve four three-year terms on the Board and an extended continuous term must be approved by two- 25 third (2/3) vote of a guorum of the Board present and voting.
- b. A Board member who has served continuously with distinctive service for a period of twelve (12) years 27 or more is eligible for consideration and election to the status of Trustee Emeritus. A former Board member 28 elected to the position of Trustee Emeritus may attend meetings of the Board of Trustees as an 29 ex-officio member without the power to vote at meetings and will not be counted to constitute a quorum 30 of the Board. Claflin University will provide a report annually to the South Carolina Annual Conference.

Standing Rule 54 has to do with the composition and election of Boards of Trustees of Columbia and 33 Wofford Colleges

Rationale: The goal of increasing the number of trustees from 28 to 31 has now been achieved and thus the current language is no longer needed.

Standing Rule 54

- 54. There shall be Boards of Trustees for Columbia College and for Wofford College, each of which shall be 40 composed of up to twenty-eight members (28) in 2004, twenty-nine (29) members in 2005, thirty (30) members in 2006 and thirty-one (31) members in 2007. Board members shall be elected by the Annual 42 Conference in conformity with the respective charters. The term of office for trustees shall be four (4) years. 43 In 2007 and thereafter, each board shall be organized into three (3) classes of eight (8) members each and 44 one (1) class of seven (7) members.
 - a. The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry annually shall nominate suitable persons to fill 46 vacancies in each class after prior consultation with the respective Boards of Trustees as stated in the 47 policies adopted by the South Carolina Annual Conference Board of Higher Education and Campus 48 Ministry (February, 1989) and the Restated Articles of Incorporation of Wofford College and Columbia 49 College. Trustees may be re-elected for additional terms, but may not serve more than a maximum of 50 three consecutive terms. After a full tenure of service a former trustee shall be ineligible for re-election 51 until a lapse of one (1) year.
 - These institutions shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Higher Education and 53 Campus Ministry.

Proposed Standing Rule 54:

- 54. There shall be Boards of Trustees for Columbia College and for Wofford College, each of which shall be 57 composed of up to thirty-one (31) members. Board members shall be elected by the Annual Conference in conformity with the respective charters. The term of office for trustees shall be four (4) years. Each board 59 shall be organized into three (3) classes of up to eight (8) members each and one (1) class of up to seven (7) 60 members.
 - a. The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry annually shall nominate suitable persons to fill 62 vacancies in each class after prior consultation with the respective Boards of Trustees as stated in the 63 policies adopted by the South Carolina Annual Conference Board of Higher Education and Campus 64 Ministry (February, 1989) and the Restated Articles of Incorporation of Wofford College and Columbia 65

- College. Trustees may be re-elected for additional terms, but may not serve more than a maximum of three consecutive terms. After a full tenure of service a former trustee shall be ineligible for re-election until a lapse of one (1) year.
- b. These institutions shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

Standing Rule 70 would enumerate those persons or organizations eligible to submit petitions to the annual conference for endorsement.

Standing Rule 70 (Existing)

70. There shall be a Committee on Petitions to the General Conference (see The Book of Discipline, Para. 507) composed of six (6) members nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that three (3) be lay persons and three (3) be clergy persons, at least half having been delegates to General Conference previously. This committee shall be considered a task force and neither a quadrennial committee nor a non-quadrennial committee.

Rationale: Proposed changes will clarify persons and organizations eligible to submit petitions to the annual conference for endorsement. The addition would clarify the process for submission of petitions and referral to the Committee. It would also provide guidance for the form and format of such petitions.

Proposed Standing Rule 70

70. There shall be a Committee on Petitions to the General Conference (see The Book of Discipline, Para. 507) composed of six (6) members nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that three (3) be lay persons and three (3) be clergy persons, at least half having been delegates to General Conference previously. This committee shall be considered a task force and neither a quadrennial committee nor a non-quadrennial committee. Petitions to the General Conference may be submitted to the Annual Conference for endorsement by any clergy member or elected lay member of the Annual Conference or by any local church board or council or any organization affiliated with the annual conference. Such petitions shall be referred to the Committee on Petitions to the General Conference by the Conference Secretary and shall be reported by this Committee to the Annual Conference with a recommendation of approval or non-approval. Petitions delivered to the Conference Secretary no later than March 15 of each conference year shall be printed in the preconference packet. After March 15, the presenters of petitions must be responsible for printing copies of their petitions for all members of the Annual Conference session. Petitions presented to the Annual Conference for endorsement must follow the provisions of ¶507 and be submitted in the format determined by the Secretary of the General Conference. The Committee on Petitions to the General Conference shall meet during the session of the Annual Conference and provide time for persons or organizations offering petitions referred to the committee to come before the committee to discuss their petitions. Petitions endorsed by the Annual Conference are submitted to the General Conference by the Conference Secretary.

Standing Rule 71 would enumerate those person or organizations eligible to submit resolutions to the annual conference for endorsement

Standing Rule 71 (Existing)

- 71. There shall be a Committee on Resolutions and Appeals composed of nine (9) members nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that six (6) be lay persons and three (3) be clergy persons. a. Resolutions initiated by a constituted board, council, commission or committee are properly before the Annual Conference without the necessity of referral.
 - a. Resolutions not initiated by a constituted board, council, commission or committee may be referred to those agencies. Any such resolution not referred to a constituted board, council, commission or committee shall be referred to the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals, and shall be reported by this Committee to the Annual Conference with a recommendation of concurrence or non-concurrence with rationale.
 - b. Resolutions delivered to the Conference Secretary no later than March 15 of each Conference year shall be published in the Pre-Conference Journal.
 - c. Additional resolutions should be referred to the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals by the end of the afternoon session on the first full business day of the Annual Conference. The group, individual or cluster presenting a resolution must be responsible for printing their resolution for all members of the Annual Conference session. The resolutions considered by the Committee on the first full day of the session shall be distributed by the close of the morning session of the second full business day of the Conference. The Report of the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals will be an 'Order of the Day' the morning of the third full business day of Annual Conference.
 - d. The Committee on Resolutions and Appeals shall on the first full business day of Annual Conference provide time for persons offering resolutions to come before the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals to define and talk about their resolutions.

Rationale: Proposed changes to SR 71 would enumerate those person or organizations eligible to submit 1 resolutions to the annual conference. The changes would also clarify the process for referring and for the 2 Committee's review of resolutions.

Proposed Standing Rule 71

- 71. There shall be a Committee on Resolutions and Appeals composed of nine (9) members nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended 7 that six (6) be lay persons and three (3) be clergy persons.
 - a. Resolutions initiated by a constituted board, council, commission or committee are properly before the 9 Annual Conference without the necessity of referral. Resolutions not initiated by a constituted board, 10 council, commission or committee of the annual conference may be referred to those agencies by the 11 Conference Secretary. Any such resolution not referred to a constituted board, council, commission or 12 committee of the Annual Conference shall be referred to the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals, 13 and shall be reported by this Committee to the Annual Conference with a recommendation of approval 14 or non-approval with rationale.
 - b. Resolutions delivered to the Conference Secretary no later than March 15 of each Conference year shall 16 be published in the Pre-Conference Journal.
 - c. Additional resolutions should shall be referred to the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals by the end 18 of the afternoon session on the first full business day of the Annual Conference. The group, individual or 19 cluster clergy member/s or elected lay member/s or organization presenting a the resolution must be 20 responsible for printing their the resolution for all members of the Annual Conference session. The resolutions considered by the Committee on the first full day of the session shall be distributed to the members 22 of the Annual Conference by the close of the morning session of the second full business day of the 23 Conference. The Report of the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals will be an 'Order of the Day' the 24 morning of the third full business day of Annual Conference.
 - The Committee on Resolutions and Appeals shall on the first full business day of Annual Conference 26 provide time for persons or organizations offering resolutions referred to the Committee to come before 27 the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals to define and talk about discuss their resolutions.

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THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

As we come to the end of the 2012-2016 quadrennium, we have the opportunity to reflect on the work of the 36 BOM over the past four years. The Board has carefully read and evaluated candidates' Bible Studies, Sermons, 37 Contextual Projects, Call and Discipline Life as well as Theology and Doctrinal Questions. We also had our first 38 class doing fruitfulness projects, which seeks to evaluate a significant ministry in the life of the parish where the 39 Provisional Elder or Deacon is serving.

The fruit of all this hard work will be celebrated tonight in our ordination service. Fourteen will be ordained 41 Elder, 5 will be ordained Deacon, and 13 will be commissioned as Provisional Elder. At the end of my report this 42 morning, we will celebrate and recognize those being licensed as local pastors. We want to thank the District 43 Committees and the BOM for their faithful work.

The BOM is very aware of the changing cultural reality in which our clergy are called to serve, as well as the 45 need to stay focused on excellence in ministry. Clergy today must be lifelong learners and sensitive to the 46 ministry context in which they serve.

A significant event happened in February of this year as sixteen members of the Board of Ministry shared in 48 a time of retreat with the extended Cabinet. Rev. Mark Tidsworth, President of the Pinnacle Consultant Firm, led 49 us in our work. Two specific purposes were set forth:

- 1. To identify a cohesive and comprehensive four year cycle of continuing education, which will 51 equip our clergy to serve as excellent pastoral leaders.
- 2. To identify an effectiveness improvement strategy for clergy who are struggling in their pastoral 53 ministry.

We were clear that the BOM and the Cabinet have different responsibilities, but it has become evident to 55 both, that there are places where we need to be in conversation. The Board's main focus is to credential clergy for service and the Cabinet appoints and supervises the work. The goal is always to encourage and support 57 clergy as they grow toward excellence. Rev. Tidsworth also raised our awareness of the changing reality of the 58 church in the world today. Our context for ministry is changing and clergy need to be aware of and empowered 59 to do ministry in that new reality. 60

Another concern was raised in Bishop Holston's observation that the number of retirees in the next 6-8 61 years could be as high as 267 and that we have only 135 pastors under the age of 45. The guestion was asked, 62 how can we strengthen the pool of candidates and empower those we already have ordained? The Recruitment 63 and Enlistment Committee of the Board continues its initiatives to address this challenge. Our experience with 64 the group mentoring process is also strengthening relationships as persons work through candidacy.

Over time, as the BOM stays engaged and our conversation with the Cabinet continues, our clergy leadership will be empowered for these days in which we are called to faithfully serve.

We are thankful for the churches that support the Ministerial Education Fund. Seminary education is expensive and your generosity helps reduce the cost for seminarians. Funds are also provided to underwrite the cost of the Course of Study for Local Pastors. This past year \$97,075 was disbursed for seminarians and \$34,250 for the Course of Study totaling \$131,325.

Our District committees are extensions of the BOM and continue to faithfully guide persons in the candidacy process and review the work of those called to licensed ministry. Our local pastors are an essential and effective part of our clergy family.

The Board of Ordained Ministry also offers several scholarships for full time students. We, once again, thank the Reverend Jeffrey Salley and his committee for their work in reviewing the applications and choosing

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THE COMMITTEE ON PETITIONS TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

The Committee on Petitions to the General Conference is made up of six members, three clergy members (John Wesley Culp, Hayes T. Gainey, Millie Nelson) and three lay members (John Redmond, Gloria Cook, Carolyn Briscoe). The task of the committee is to review the petitions, hear concerns of the presenters and other 13 interested persons, and to make a recommendation of concurrence or non-concurrence to the conference.

Two petitions were submitted for consideration prior to Annual Conference: the first to

Amend ¶161f of the 2012 Book of Discipline, and the second A petition to the 2016 General Conference to 16 Withdraw the United Methodist Church from the Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice (RCRC). To ensure 17 their understanding of the petitions, the committee met once prior to Annual Conference. A second committee 18 meeting was held on Monday evening during Annual Conference and followed a time of discussion with persons 19 who wished to raise questions or to express their opinions on these issues.

On the first day of Annual Conference, Dr. Carolyn Briscoe, Committee Chair, presented the two petitions as 21 information and stated that they would be presented for action on Thursday. At that time the committee presented 22 their unanimous recommendation of concurrence on the petition to Amend ¶161f of the 2012 Book of Discipline. Following discussion, a vote was taken and the petition failed by a vote of 716 to 519. The second petition to 24 Withdraw the United Methodist Church from the Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice (RCRC) was then 25 presented with the committee's unanimous recommendation of non-concurrence. Following discussion Bishop 26 Holston called for the vote and non-concurrence was affirmed, 674-544.

As a result of the votes neither of these petitions was forwarded by the Annual Conference to the General 28 Conference for consideration.

SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2017 COMPREHENSIVE BENEFIT FUNDING PLAN SUMMARY

INTRODUCTION

60 The 2012 *Book of Discipline* ¶ 1506.6 requires that each annual conference develop, adopt and implement a 61 formal comprehensive funding plan for funding all of its benefit obligations. The funding plan shall be submitted 62 annually to the General Board of Pension and Health benefits for review and be approved annually by the annual 63 conference, following the receipt and inclusion of a favorable written opinion from the General Board of Pension 64 and Health Benefits (GBPHB). This document is only a summary of the information contained in the actual 65 signed funding plan and does not contain all the information required for a comprehensive view of the conference's benefit obligations. You may request the full contents of the 2017 comprehensive benefit funding plan from your conference benefit office.

CLERGY RETIREMENT SECURITY PROGRAM (CRSP) 5 6 **Defined Benefit (DB) and Defined Contribution (DC)** 7

Program overview:

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The Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) is an Internal Revenue Code section 403(b) retirement program providing lifetime income and account flexibility designed for those who serve as clergy of The United Methodist Church. The program is designed to provide participants with one portion of their overall retirement benefits. CRSP replaced the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) effective January 1, 2007, which had previously 12 replaced the Pre-82 Plan for service rendered prior to January 1, 1982. CRSP consists of both a defined benefit (DB) plan, which provides a monthly benefit at retirement based upon years of credited service to The United Methodist Church, and a defined contribution (DC) plan, which provides a retirement account balance 15 established and funded by the annual conferences.

17 **Current funding plan information:**

The Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP-DB) annuities total liability as of January 1, 2015 is \$1.271 19 billion, while total plan assets are \$1.407 billion, resulting in a current plan funded ratio of 111%. The South 20 Carolina Conference portion of the liability is 2.8443% with a 2017 contribution of \$2,774,019. The conference 21 anticipates that the amount will be funded by Direct Billing - representing year over year in how contributions are 22 to be funded. Additionally, General Conference 2012 approved a change to CRSP that provides each annual 23 conference the discretion to determine whether to cover three-quarter and/or half-time clergy. The South 24 Carolina Conference has elected to cover clergy serving 100% under CRSP effective January 1, 2017.

Effective January 1, 2014 the CRSP-DC plan was reduced from a 3% to a 2% of plan compensation 26 non-matching contribution. Clergy have the opportunity to earn up to an additional 1% CRSP-DC contribution by contributing at least 1% of their plan compensation to UMPIP; therefore, if a participant contributes at least 1% of plan compensation to UMPIP, the individual will receive a contribution of 3%, which is unchanged from 2013. 29 The 2017 CRSP-DC contribution is anticipated to be \$870,400 and will be funded by Direct Billed to local 30 churches - representing year over year in how contributions are to be funded.

MINISTERIAL PENSION PLAN (MPP)

33 Plan overview:

Supplement Three to the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP), also known as the Ministerial Pen-35 sion Plan (MPP), provides clergy with a pension benefit for their years of ministry with The United Methodist 36 Church from 1982 through 2006. MPP is an Internal Revenue Code section 403(b) retirement plan. Effective January 1, 2014, exactly 65% of the account balance must be annuitized when the funds are to be distributed. The remainder may be rolled over to UMPIP, into an IRA or another qualified plan, or it may be paid out as a lump sum.

41 **Current funding plan information:**

The Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) annuities' total liability as of January 1, 2015 is \$3.122 billion, while total plan assets are \$3.509 billion, resulting in a current plan funded ratio of 112% and no required contribution for 2017. The South Carolina Conference's portion of the total liability is 2.6365%. Future MPP annuitants have a 45 total account balance of \$4.145 billion and the South Carolina Conference's portion of that balance is 46 \$108,261,052 or 2.61% of the total.

48 **PRE-1982 PLAN**

49 Plan overview:

50 Supplement One to the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP), also known as the Pre-1982 Plan, pro-51 vides clergy with a pension benefit for their years of ministry with The United Methodist Church prior to 1982. 52 The Pre-1982 Plan was replaced by MPP effective January 1, 1982. If a clergy person retires within the Confer-53 ence (and does not terminate), the minimum benefit payable is based on two factors: 1) years of service with 54 pension credit and 2) the Conference pension rate. Years of service with pension credit are approved by each 55 Conference on the recommendation of the Conference Board of Pensions (CBOP) in accordance with plan pro-56 visions and The Book of Discipline. The pension rate, also called the Past Service Rate (PSR), is the dollar 57 amount chosen by the Conference as the amount payable for each approved year of service with pension credit. 58 The pension rate may change from year to year. The number of years of service with pension credit is multiplied 59 by the pension rate, and the product is the minimum annual benefit payable to those clergy eligible for Pre-1982 60 Plan benefits. In certain situations, the benefit received from the Pre-1982 plan may vary based on the applica-61 bility of what is referred to as Defined Benefit Service Money (DBSM), which is the defined contribution feature 62 of the Pre-1982 Plan. At the time that a participant retires, the DBSM account is converted to a life based benefit 63 and, at that point, the clergy's benefit is the greater of the PSR or DBSM benefit. If the conference increases the 64 PSR, the clergy's benefit is recalculated; but the DBSM based benefit does not change.

Current funding plan information:

The 2017 PSR recommended to the South Carolina Conference will be \$765.00, representing a 2.00% increase from the 2016 rate. The conference expects future increases to be approximately 2.00%, which is based 3 on the following rationale: Goal is to increase by 2% per year.

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The contingent annuitant percentage is recommended to remain at the 75% level.

Based on the final actuarial valuations from the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits as of January 1, 2015 for 2017, the portion of the Pre-1982 liability and assets attributable to the South Carolina Conference and its related funded status are as follows:

ACTIVE HEALTH BENEFIT PROGRAM

Program Overview:

The South Carolina Conference offers the following active health benefit to its active eligible participants: 16 Self Funded-HealthFlex.

Current funding plan information:

The total cost of the program for 2017 is anticipated to be \$8.260.428 and will be funded by premiums that 20 are Direct Billed to the local churches. It is anticipated that increases for future years will average 6.5% based on 21 the following rationale: Historical increase.

Additional Conference Sponsored Coverage

The South Carolina Conference has elected to provide health benefits coverage to the following groups during periods where, without conference funded premiums; the participants would not be provided coverage or benefits (all figures as of 12/31/2015):

The total estimated cost of conference sponsored coverage as of 12/31/2015 is \$317,880.

POST-RETIREMENT MEDICAL BENEFIT PROGRAM (PRM)

Program Overview:

The South Carolina Conference post-retirement medical program currently offers a Stipend.

Current funding plan information:

The conference's expectation for 2017 is to offer the following benefits: Defined Contribution of \$200 per 40 month for all covered retirees and covered spouses retiring prior to 01/01/2016. Al eligible retirees and covered 41 spouses retiring on or after 01/01/2016 will receive a defined contribution of \$100 an month per covered person.

The funding obligation for 2017 is anticipated to be \$1,489,096 with the following funding sources: Surplus 43 Redirection from Own Pre-82. On a longer term basis, the conference intends to ensure funding by: Funded 44 through apportionment and transfer of Pre-1982 surplus.

Based on the most recent PRM valuation dated 12/31/2015, the following is the funded position of the postretirement medical benefits:

Expected Post Retirement Obligation (EPBO) or net conference cost \$23,209,410 Accumulated Post Retirement Obligation (APBO) or net conference cost \$20,864,883 Assets designated for PRM \$14,541,255 Service Cost (SC) or net conference cost \$327,161

As a preview of the 2018 CBFP requirement, a new PRM Funding Contribution requirement will be mandatory for conferences requesting a full favorable CBFP opinion. This year the calculation for informational purposes only is as follows:

Funded Status, [3. - 2.] \$(6,323,628) Number of Annual Payments 20 Portion of Funded Status Payable [5. / 6., but zero if 5. is positive] \$316,181 PRM Funding Contribution, Informational purposes only [4. + 7.] \$643,342

These values are based on a 3.85% long term discount rate, a 0% long-term expected rate of return on assets, and a current medical trend rate of 6.50% with an ultimate medical trend rate of 5.0%, beginning in 2019.

COMPREHENSIVE PROTECTION PLAN (CPP)

Plan Overview:

The Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) provides death, long-term disability and other welfare benefits for 64 eligible clergy of The United Methodist Church and their families. It is an Internal Revenue Code 414(e) "church 65 1 plan" funded by plan sponsor insurance premiums. Generally, clergy are eligible to participate in CPP if the 2 conference or salary-paying unit sponsors the plan and they are able to satisfy the eligibility requirements which 3 include full-time appointment with plan compensation equal to or greater than 60% of the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC) or the Conference Average Compensation (CAC), whichever is less.

Current funding plan information:

The South Carolina Conference has made the following elections: 1 % of appointed clergy have mandatory participation under special arrangements, while 0% of appointed clergy have optional participation under special arrangements. 9

For 2017, the South Carolina Conference has an expected required contribution to the Comprehensive Protection Plan of \$1,196,851, which is anticipated to be funded by: Direct Billed to local churches. The anticipated 12 average increase in future years is expected to be 2.40% per year as a result of: Change in the CAC.

UNITED METHODIST PERSONAL INVESTMENT PLAN (UMPIP) FOR LAY AND CLERGY

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The United Methodist Personal Investment Plan (UMPIP) is an Internal Revenue Code section 403(b) 17 defined contribution retirement savings plan for clergy and lay employees of The United Methodist Church and 18 affiliated organizations. Participants may make before-tax, Roth and/or after-tax contributions through payroll 19 deductions. Participant contributions, various optional plan sponsor contributions and investment earnings 20 comprise the individual's retirement account balance.

22 Current funding plan information:

Conference office lay employees working an average of 30 hours per week or more are immediately eligible 24 for a plan sponsor funded pension contribution of 9% of salary if the employee contributes 3%. Lay employees 25 are encouraged to make contributions toward their retirement through payroll deductions to the UMPIP. The 26 estimated contribution for the South Carolina Conference is anticipated to be \$99,118 and will be funded via 27 Apportionment.

OTHER CONFERENCE BENEFIT OBLIGATIONS: DEFINED CONTRIBUTION (DC) TYPE

30 Plan Overview:

The South Carolina Conference currently offers the following DC benefit(s): Conference Lay Employee 32 Death & Disability. The funding obligation for 2017 is anticipated to be \$17,735 with the funding sources to be: 33 Apportioned. The anticipated average increase in future years is expected to be 2.5% per year due to: Salary 34 Increases and age adjustments.

36 Plan Overview:

The South Carolina Conference currently offers the following DC benefit(s): Death Benefits for Pre BPP 38 Retired Lay Employees. The funding obligation for 2017 is anticipated to be \$190 with the funding sources to be: 39 Apportionments. The anticipated average increase in future years is expected to be -5.0% per year due to: 40 Death of Pre BPP Retirees.

42 OTHER CONFERENCE BENEFIT OBLIGATIONS: DEFINED BENEFIT (DB) TYPE

43 Plan Overview:

The South Carolina Conference currently offers a DB Special Grants plan made available to one individual. The funding obligation for 2017 is anticipated to be \$200 with the funding sources to be: Till death of recipient of 46 Special grant of \$16.88 per month. The anticipated average increase in future years is expected to be 0% per year due to: Negociated Special Grant. The liability associated with this benefit is estimated to be \$1,000 based 48 on a discount rate of 4%.

50 CONCLUSION

The 2017 Comprehensive Benefit Funding Plan and the above Summary document incorporates, to the best 51 52 of our understanding, the South Carolina Conference's obligations and funding requirements of the benefits 53 provided to the clergy and laity of the South Carolina Conference.

Mission. The mission of the South Carolina United Methodist Foundation, Inc., is to cultivate, develop, and administer current and deferred gifts for endowment to support United Methodist institutions, agencies, and local churches, as well as other church-related ministries and charitable purposes and to encourage planned giving among United Methodists in South Carolina.

The General Endowment Fund. The General Endowment Fund is the Foundation's basic support fund. The operating expenses of the Foundation are a first claim against the income of the Foundation's General Endowment. Income after expenses may be distributed at the discretion of the Foundation's Board of Directors to the Institutional Members of the Foundation. The Foundation actively solicits gifts and bequests for its General Endowment. Any gift or bequest to the Foundation which is not designated for the benefit of a specific institution, agency, local church, or other charitable purpose is added to the Foundation's General Endowment.

Designated Endowment Funds. Designated Endowment Funds are Funds owned and administered by the Foundation for the benefit of a designated institution, agency, local church, or other charitable purpose. Designated Funds may be "open" and receive contributions from many donors, or they may be "closed" having been established by the gift of a single donor or family. Restricted Funds may be established by current gifts or they may be established by deferred gifts such as a bequest, a gift annuity, or a distribution from a trust.

Charitable Gift Annuities. The Foundation initiated a charitable remainder gift annuity program in 1981. A gift annuity is a life income charitable gift vehicle which provides a guaranteed income for one or two lives. In exchange for an irrevocable gift to the Foundation of cash or publicly traded securities, the Foundation contracts to make annual payments for life to the donor or other life income beneficiary based on a fixed rate determined by age at the time of the gift.

Assets Under Agreement. Assets administered under agreement are endowment funds placed with the Foundation for administration under the terms of a revocable agreement by local churches, boards, agencies, or other organizations affiliated with the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. Such organizations become "Agency Members" of the Foundation. Funds placed with the Foundation under this program are commingled with other designated funds of the Foundation for investment purposes.

Self-supporting. The Foundation is self-supporting. Its annual operating costs are funded by income from its General Endowment Funds and Administrative Endowment Fund and from administrative fees charged other funds which are owned or administered by the Foundation. The business, property, and affairs of the Foundation are managed by a Board of Directors composed of the following members:

JOSEPH B. BETHEA DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

South Carolina Conference Laity or Clergy who have shown a strong commitment to Christian social justice for at lease five years are eligible.

Bishop Bethea was the first African American bishop to be appointed to the South Carolina Conference UMC. Richly immersed in the African American heritage and traditions of the "Black Church," he also believed in racial reconciliation and equality. He served two conferences as district superintendent and was a professor at Duke University before being elected bishop.

Rev. Ken Nelson reminds us so much of Bishop Bethea in stature, vision, giftedness, experiences and heart. Overcoming great obstacles as a child, he refused to be defined by the adversity he encountered. Instead he views the love he received from people who mentored him throughout this conference as a great blessing which empowered him to choose "the more excellent way" of living for Christ.

He is a brilliant scholar, having served as the Assistant Dean of the Chapel and Director of Religious Life at Duke University. He is steeped in the African American tradition and served as the Conference's African American Coordinator but believes in racial inclusiveness, social justice and equality, and served with distinction in one of our first appointments across racial lines from 1994-1998 and from 2000-2002 as an associate pastor at St. John UMC in Aiken, South Carolina. He has pastored large and small congregations throughout the conference and has preached all throughout the United Methodist connection, but his message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ remains consistent and his work ethic is undeniable. He served as a Congregational Specialist and presently serves as the Coordinator of Clergy Services and Conference Secretary where he serves with professionalism and compassion. Rev. Nelson has been elected to General and Jurisdictional Conferences. He is a worthy recipient of the Joseph B. Bethea Distinguished Service Award.

BARBARA BOULTINGHOUSE BRIDGE BUILDERS AWARD

The Barbara Boultinghouse Bridge Builder award, named after a UMC deaconess, is given to a person or organization in the S.C. conference who has built bridge of understanding by promoting equity and inclusiveness without regard to race, gender, age, handicap or economic condition. It is sponsored by the Commission on Religion and Race

Barbara Boultinghouse had a radical and amazing love for all humanity that reached across racial, social, ethnic, and cultural differences. She was the heart of Boylan Haven Mather Academy, a private United Methodist school for young African American students in Camden, SC and was a committed member at the predominantly African American congregation at Trinity UMC, now Camden First UMC. She spread her love all over the town of Camden to everyone who came her way.

Many decades later in the same town, a predominantly African American congregation worshipping in a brand new edifice, Good Hope Wesley Chapel United Methodist Church, flooded. Within days, mold began to set in. The pastor, Reverend Angela Ford Nelson, devastated by the disaster, but exhibiting that same love Barbara had for all humanity, began to share that story with her supervising elder, the Reverend Steve Patterson, the pastor of the predominantly White congregation, Lyttleton Street United Methodist Church. Immediately, "Pastor Steve" did what Barbara would have done – he informed his congregation of the devastation and not only did they decide to help, they decided to underwrite a portion of the repairs and work until the repairs were completed. Having no flood insurance, coupled with a newly acquired mortgage, without Lyttleton Street's help, the flood could have devastated Good Hope Wesley Chapel.

As the members of Good Hope Wesley Chapel and Lyttleton Street worked together, they became friends. They learned about each other's families, hopes, dreams and passions. College students, home on break, came to work with their parents. Invitations to each other's church services were extended and accepted. Personal contributions were made. They rebuilt a church, YES, but they also built bridges of friendship that will last forever.

While it is traditional to give this award to one person, it also remains true that if a bridge is built, it must go from one place to another and these two pastors, one a mentor and ordained elder, Rev. Steve A. Patterson, the other a licensed local pastor, Rev. Angela Ford Nelson, brought their churches together in a town that still is divided in many ways. Along the way these congregations became Christian friends and built a bridge of love and relationship that has endured long since.

BISHOP FIVE STAR AWARD

Bishop's Five Star Award is to provide an incentive for churches to embrace new ministries each year geared toward growth and outreach. The awards enable small churches—as well as large churches—to receive recognition. The criteria is:

- 1. An increase in Sunday school attendance and/or enhancement of Christian education ministry;
- 2. A "new work" that impacts growth;
- 3. Members received by profession of faith or rededication one for every 100 members;
- 4. Emphasis on youth ministries that demonstrate growth; and
- 5. All apportionments paid in full for the prior year, or a 25% increase in apportionment payments compared to two years prior.
