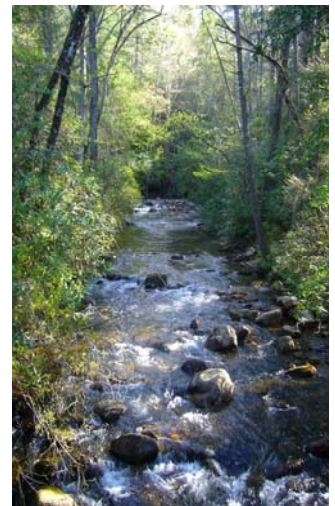

Spotlight on Units UMW

Salkehatchie.

For most people, that word has absolutely no meaning. It might not even sound like a real word. But for me, it means so much more than just twelve letters crammed together to make an awkward-sounding word.

Salkehatchie is a week-long service camp that I participate in every summer with my church. It is a "ministry of the S.C. UMC Conference".

It's for youth, beginning at age fourteen, and adults who are interested in spending a week serving others. Salkehatchie's focus is to repair the houses of our less fortunate neighbors.

Every year, in the sweltering hot June sun, a group from my church goes to Summerville, S.C. to participate in five days of hard manual labor. (There are other camps in S.C., we choose to go to Summerville). The work ranges from replacing roofs to painting walls and rebuilding air conditioner stands.

We wake up at 6 am and get ready, which is earlier than I wake up for school. So much for vacation. Breakfast is at 6:30, and we don't eat until everyone, even the lazy late-sleepers, have made it to the dining area. After breakfast, we crowd into the cars, trucks or vans and head to our sites for the day.

Once we get to the site, we have devotion and then get to work. The heat isn't so bad in the early morning, but about 10:00 it gets serious.

Temperatures get in the 100's, and the sweat pours. Even the girliest people I know, who would usually freak out if they

"glisten" even a little, don't care about the shirt-soaking sweat they are experiencing.

The work is serious, and I've got quite a few battle wounds to show for it. But it doesn't seem like nine hours of hard labor when we're out there having fun.

Sure, it's hot, but there's nothing more fulfilling than helping someone who both needs and deserves it.

It's not all work, though. Every night after showering at Summerville High School, we have delicious supper and worship services. I don't mean to brag, but Methodists sure can cook.

After a week of sweat, blood, and sometimes tears, we visit all the homes that have been worked on and see the improvements. After visiting the homes, we go back to the church for a closing service. It's an emotional time as we present our symbols for the week and talk about the great time we've shared together. It's difficult to leave Salkehatchie, but it's comforting to know we won't be away for too long.

Salkehatchie is an amazing experience I hope to participate in for many years to come.

As I write this, I am in the middle of making preparations for Assembly, as many of you are. I know you are also busy with the things that spring brings: planting vegetables and flowers, attending school activities, etc. Even as our schedules get full, please make time to say a prayer for our School of Christian Mission. Pray for guidance in making your decision to attend, for the study leaders who are working and studying to bring God's message to you, and for the people who are making plans for rooms, meals, banners, and plenaries. Most of all, pray that what we do will bring glory to God. Since last year's school, the SC Conference UMW members have contributed enough money to fund a sewing school in Sudan. This program will be implemented over one or two years. Each woman who receives a machine will first be trained. This means that one woman in each village in the chosen district will have

a business and a means to earn money for her family. The names of the three studies and an overview of each one were in the last issue of Mission Echo, along with the registration form and information sheet. Please revisit that site if you need this information. One of the studies, Joy to the World: Mission in the Age of Global Christianity, may be used for Lay Speaker Recertification. If you would like to use this study for recertification, go to the website, www.sclayspeaking.org. Print the form and send it to your district director prior to the School of Christian Mission. You can go directly to the form with this link: <http://www.sclayspeaking.org/Request%20for%20Recertification%20Credit.pdf>. Rev. Ken Nelson has informed us that ministers who attend the school in the Formation in Ministry Program must stay for all nine hours of the class to receive credit.

Please be aware of this when you register and make any arrangements that you need to in order to stay for the Sunday morning class. I am so excited about our team of study leaders. Bill Andress and Lois Coster will return for the Sudan study. For the Love of God: John's Letters will be led by June Willson, Dr. Evelyn Fulmore, Rev. Jack Washington, Edd Cunningham, and Rev. Connie Barnes. Our Mission & Evangelism study leaders will be Angela Ford-Nelson, Sue Owens, and Narcie Jeter. Narcie will also lead our Bible Study. In June these people will take time out of their busy schedules to go to Regional School in Virginia for study and preparation. Please pray for safe travel for our School Team. The theme for this year's youth study is Mission and Evangelism and is called Embracing The World. Emphasis will be placed on how mission and evangelism are changing in an age of globalization. The event will

be held in August at Chapin United Methodist Church. A flyer and a registration form are included in this issue of Mission Echo. You can see why I'm so excited about this year's school. The studies, the leaders, the fun, the fellowship – you don't want to miss it!

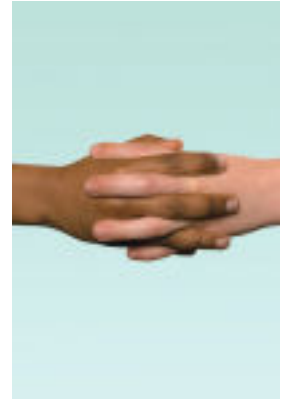

Sudan Update

Dear Sudanese Friends and Friends of the Sudanese people,

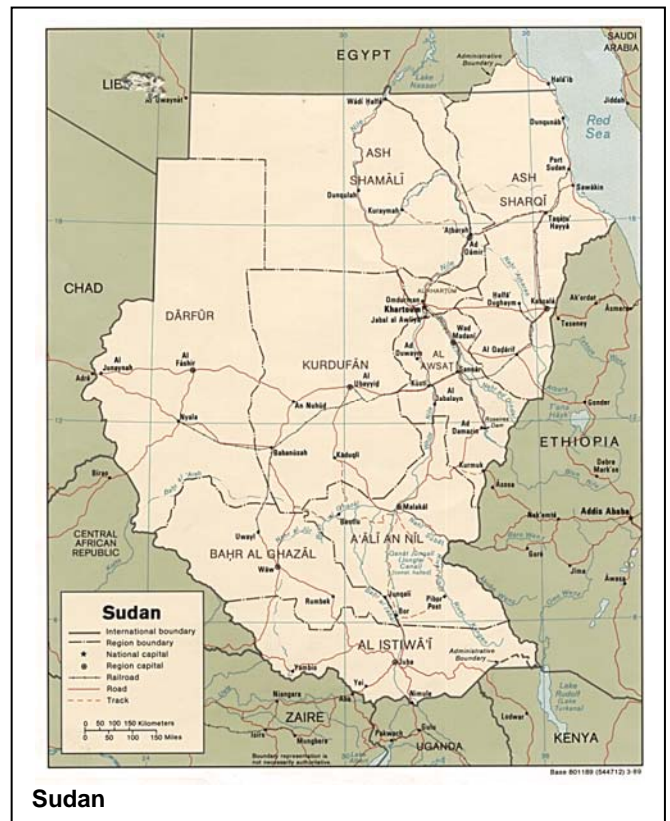
There are at least two ways to look at the information in this update from SAAF. One way is as part of a continuing stream of issues that seem to be flowing from Sudan following the elections. The other way is to note that two leaders are speaking out in very sensible ways. We recognize that if they can inspire others, Sudan's future surely will be brighter.

The Deputy SPLM Secretary General for northern Sudan, Yasir Arman, is reaching out to northern Sudanese to form an alliance to "establish the New Sudan and define a common vision for democratization, self-determination, popular consultation and a just solution to the Darfur conflict as one package for a genuine democratic transition and full implementation of the CPA." His is a comprehensive approach to solving Sudan's issues. Arman also was critical of the U.N. forces for failing to effectively maintain security in Southern Sudan. May others join him in seeking to deal with the totality of Sudan rather than narrowly addressing a single element?

Rev Ramadan Chan, the relatively new but highly effective General Secretary of the Sudan Council of Churches, seeks to get the dissident candidates to accept the results of the elections as the only practical way to move forward while acknowledging that the elections did not "go right". Rev. Ramadan is a servant-leader in the true sense of the phrase; we pray that his leadership and example may serve to encourage other church, political, tribal, and military leaders to serve the public in the same way.
