Charlie enjoyed running, playing guitar, reading and being with his family




CYNTHIA LOUISE SWOFFORD November 16, 1956 – July 10, 2013

RETIRED MINISTERS

CHARLES MARTIN BLACKMON

December 1, 1921 - January 27, 2014



The Reverend Charles Martin Blackmon was born December 1st, 1921, in Lancaster, SC. He was the eldest son of William Martin Blackmon and Ella Marion Bagley Blackmon.

He graduated from Spartanburg Junior College in 1943, Wofford College in 1948 (majoring in Education and Psychology) and Garrett Theological Seminary, Northwestern University, Evanston, IL in 1952, with a Divinity degree specializing in Psychology and Pastoral Counseling.

He served with distinction as an Administrative Staff Sergeant in WWII from 1944-1946, European theatre, on the staff of General George S. Patton during the liberation of the Jewish concentration camps. He gave a presentation at General Patton's last staff meeting on the location of supply units.

Reverend Blackmon served a circuit of two churches in the Northwest Indiana conference while attending Garrett Theological Seminary. They were Otterbein UMC (Otterbein) and Montmorenci

UMC (Montmorenci). He founded Ridge UMC (Munster) which started in a funeral home and was eventually established over a ten year period. Subsequently, he ministered to Broadway UMC (Indianapolis) before returning to the South Carolina Conference. While at Broadway UMC, he was a Member of the Counseling Center. He was responsible for local and world mission programs, social concerns and membership cultivation. He also assisted the Senior Pastor in total direction of church programs.

While serving in the Northwest Indiana Conference, he was Director of Conference Junior Camp, Member of Conference Board of Social Concerns and Evangelism, Member of Board of Trustees for the Indiana Methodist Children's Home, Secretary of the Calumet District Northwest Indiana Conference, Member of Board of Directors of the Health and Welfare Fund.

After returning to the SC Conference, Reverend Blackmon served at Grace UMC (North Augusta), and Buncombe Street UMC (Greenville). He took a sabbatical leave from the SC Conference and was employed as a Counselor with the SC Employment Security Commission in Greenville. He accepted a managerial position with the SC Employment Security Commission and moved to Rock Hill. He later transferred to Columbia as Area Director of three counties (Richland, Fairfield and Lexington).

While attending Bethel UMC (Columbia) he was voted as Pastor Emeritus for his outstanding service of 26 years. Over the years, Reverend Blackmon was active in many religious, community, political, and educational causes in Indiana and South Carolina. Most recently, Columbia Rotary (33 years) and the Benton Young Friday the 13th Club in Columbia.

Surviving is his wife of 69 years, Gladys Belk Blackmon of the home; daughters, Debbie Blackmon of Rock Hill, South Carolina and Diane Blackmon of York, South Carolina; a brother and sister-in-law, Ben and Cathy Blackmon of LaPlata, Maryland along with several nieces and nephews. 
BARRY FRANKLIN BRINSON, SR.





ANGELIN JONES SIMMONS

January 23, 1951 - February 20, 2014



Angelin Jones Simmons was the first African American woman to be appointed as a District Superintendent in the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference of the United Methodist Church. In June 1994, the late Bishop Joseph Bethea appointed her as the District Superintendent of the Orangeburg District of the South Carolina Annual Conference.

The daughter of the late Mr. Leroy W. and Mrs. Elsie P. Jones, Angelin was born on Wednesday, January 23, 1951 at 2:30 pm. Her mother told her that she was the most eager child to come into the world, and that she was eating from a spoon at two weeks old.

As a participant in the desegregation of the Berkeley County School System, Reverend Simmons graduated from Berkeley High School in 1967. She entered South Carolina State College at the age of sixteen in 1967. There she excelled in her studies and graduated in 1971 with a Bachelor of Arts in History. She was a

member of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated and Lily Chapter #134 Order of the Eastern Star. She earned her Master of Divinity Degree with a concentration in Pastoral Care and Counseling in 1974 from Gammon Theological Seminary at the ITC.

She was ordained a Deacon in the United Methodist Church to Word, Sacrament, and Order in June 1975, and ordained an Elder in 1977. Becoming a full member of the South Carolina Annual Conference resulted in Reverend Simmons being nominated to serve on various boards and committees. The year 1988 was momentous when she was elected as a delegate to the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference where she witnessed and participated in the election of Bishop Joseph B. Bethea. In 1992, she was elected as a reserve delegate to the General Conference in Louisville, Kentucky. She was a delegate to both the General Conference (1996) and the Jurisdictional Conferences (1992, 1996, 2000). She was the first African American clergywoman to be elected to these conferences.

Appointed to the Johns Island Parish as the Associate Pastor in 1975, she began her journey in pastoral ministry. The Johns Island Parish was five churches located on three Sea

Island Coasts of Charleston, South Carolina. She found that each Church and each Island was distinct with their own diverse personalities. She left the Johns Island Parish after seven years. In 2002, she was again appointed to the Johns Island Parish, which consisted of three churches — Bethlehem, New Webster, and Saint James United Methodist Churches. Her appointments included:



THEODORE BRANDON THOMAS, JR.

July 1, 1923 - March 31, 2014

Theodore B. Thomas Jr., was born in Orangeburg on July 1, 1923, to the late Rev. Theodore Brandon and Wilhelmina Minus Thomas, Sr. Affectionately known as "Coach" he devoted his life to the church, his family, community service and to teaching and inspiring young people to realize their full potential.

After high school, Thomas received a full scholarship to South Carolina State College, where he received All American Football honors. In 1944, his college studies were interrupted by his service in the U.S. Army during WWII. While in the military, Thomas participated in the Pacific Olympics in Saipan in the spring of 1945, winning a bronze medal in the discus competition. Returning to complete his college education after the war, he graduated with a B.S. degree from South Carolina State University in 1947 and completed the M.S degree from Indiana University. Thomas also completed further study at Michigan State University.



Prior to moving to Hartsville and teaching in 1950, Thomas was Dean of Men and Assistant Coach at Claflin University. He taught for more than 30 years at Butler High School and served as Athletic Director and Head Coach amassing a basketball record of 584-144 that included two State championships. His record also includes the following: South Carolina Nominee-National Basketball Coach of the Year 1979; Four Football Conference Championships; State Basketball Coach of the year-1980; Regional Basketball Coach of the Year-1981; One of sixty-five players inducted into the South Carolina State University Athletic Hall of Fame in 1998 and recognized as one of the "100 Most Outstanding Players" in the long storied history of South Carolina State University in 2007.

Heeding the call to ministry, Thomas followed in the footsteps of his father and grandfather, Dr. Daniel M. Minus, founder of Sterling High School in Greenville (both Methodist ministers). He became a licensed minister in the Methodist Church in 1947. While an ordained minister, he also served as an associate chaplain at McCleod Regional Medical Center. His UMC Conference appointments included the York Charge, 1960; Pageland Charge (Salem UMC and Oro UMC), 1961-1973; Latta Charge (Andrews Chapel UMC, St. Phillips UMC, and Glen Chapel UMC), 1973-1993; retired Supply Pastor, Mount Zion UMC; Retired Supply Pastor, New Hope UMC; then returned to Pageland and fully retired in 2002. He also completed Advanced Course Study for Certification at Duke University.

In 1985, he won a Hartsville City Council seat and quickly gained a reputation of being a business-like problem solver. Retiring from City Council in 2007, city officials formally dedicated the \$2.2 million, 23,000-square-foot, multi-use facility "The Coach T.B. Thomas Sports Center," named in his honor in 2008. In January 2011, another facility was dedicated in his honor at Hartsville High School, "The Hewitt-Thomas Basketball Court".

Thomas was inducted in the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Omicron Chapter at Gammon Theological Seminary in Atlanta and was a proud 70 year Omega Man. Thomas was a much loved husband, father, and grandfather, and welcomed his first great-grandchild, Liam Brandon Thomas in 2012. Mourning his loss are his beloved and devoted wife, Lovis Thompson Thomas; his daughter Brandolyn Thomas Pinkston (Jerome) of Columbia; his son, Dr. Theodore B. Thomas, III (Janice) of Clinton, North Carolina; grandchildren, Paula Clanton Payton (Tony) of Orangeburg, Dr. Torrence Nathaniel Thomas (Lena) of Washington, DC, Christopher Brandon Thomas (Daphne) of Charlotte, Joya Lee Pinkston of Columbia; a brother in-law, Tenus F. Thompson of Lawrenceville, Virginia; a nephew, Tenus F. Thompson, Jr. and a niece. Paula C. Thompson of Chesapeake, Virginia.






CATHERINE ROBERTA (DOT) FORRESTER June 10, 1928 – March 6, 2014
