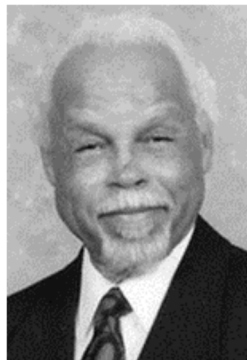

## **RETIRED MINISTERS**

### **JOHN DELEON BOONE, JR.**

**August 11, 1919 – April 26, 2018**



John Deleon Boone, Jr., was born on August 11, 1919 to the late John D. Boone, Sr. and Jessie O. Freeman Boone of St. Stephen, SC. Preceding him in death were his brothers, Carlton T. and Angelo P. Boone and his sister, Pearl B. Shecut.

John was educated in the primary schools of St. Stephen, SC where he was born and raised. When he was but a boy, the Lord spoke to him at a church revival at Zion United Methodist Church. The Lord had His hand on John at an early age. The Lord would later reveal to John the purpose for his life and journey ahead. It would lead him down a path of service and ministry.

John was truly a humble servant. He not only pastored numerous churches, but he ministered to his family and his community. As a young man, he took care of his ailing mother - praying for and with her until the Lord called her home. He was a wonderful brother, taking over a mail route while his brother Angelo was serving his country. He was a devoted servant to the Lord and to God's

people.

John entered the United States Army on November 13, 1942. He served his country during World War II as a Technical Sergeant. He was awarded the Good Conduct Medal.

During his time in the Army, he served in Rome, Italy; Arnot, Southern France and Rhineland, Germany. He was honorably discharged as a Tech 4 on November 14, 1945.

After his stint in the military, John entered Claflin College, now Claflin University, where he obtained his Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1950. While attending Claflin, he became a member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated. He then continued his studies at Gammon Theological Seminary in Atlanta, GA, where he received his Masters of Divinity Degree in 1956.

Upon graduating from Gammon, John began his pastorate in the South Carolina Methodist Conference where he served on several boards and committees across the conference. His appointments would include: St. Jude-St. James, 1948-50; Jedburg-Murray Charge, 1955-58; Pinopolis Charge, 1958-64; Wesley in Charleston, 1964-72; Cumberland, 1972-76; Anderson as District Superintendent, 1976-79; Trinity, 1979-83; Francis Brown-Enoch Chapel, 1983; Secretary of SC Conference, 1966, 1968, 1972; Committee on Nominations, 1972-76; Trustee, Wofford College, 1974; Board of Health & Welfare, 1980.

In 1990, John retired from the ministry after 43 years of service. His journey was about service to God and His people. He never met a stranger. With love in his heart for God's people, he always treated others with respect, humility and compassion. He aimed to put a smile on anyone's face who was not smiling with his charm, wit, endearing smile and reminder of how good it was "to be among the living." He was a faithful, loving husband to his wife, a devoted father and a teacher of God's word.

John leaves to cherish his memories: his wonderful wife of 62 years, Gladys L. Boone of Summerville, SC; four sons, John D. Boone, III (Carla) of Ladson, SC, Reginald K. Boone of Summerville, SC, Gregory R. Boone of Summerville, SC and Roger S. Boone (Ronnye) of Concord, NC; a daughter, Marcelle D. Kee (Wilkins) of Waxhaw, NC; grandchildren, Matthew D. Boone of Charleston, SC, Sydney E. Boone of Atlanta, GA, Carter B. Boone of Concord, NC, Ashley N. Boone of Concord, NC, Christian L. Kee of Waxhaw, NC and Peyton A. #### **JAMES BOYD CHEWNING**

**September 5, 1938 – November 1, 2017**

James Boyd Chewning was born in Mullins, South Carolina to Claudius Pritchard and Alliene Leach Chewning. He had two older brothers and an older sister. A younger sister came along the following year. His father was a Methodist minister and a member of the South Carolina Conference. Boyd spent his youthful years moving around the state with his family to his father's assigned appointments. When he was a teenager his father was assigned to Bethel United Methodist Church at Oswego in Sumter County. Boyd graduated from Mayewood High School in 1956 and Wofford College in 1960. He then entered the Candler School of Theology at Emory where he earned the M.Div. in 1963.

He was admitted to the conference On Trial in 1961 and ordained a Full Elder in 1965. He served 15 churches in 8 districts of the conference. His appointments were: 1963 Union Charge, 1965 Associate, First Myrtle Beach, 1967 Associate First Lancaster, 1968 Valley Falls-Fingerville, 1971 Trinity, North Myrtle Beach, 1972 Bethel-Ebenezer, 1976 Bethlehem-Salem, 1978 Springfield Charge, 1982 Victor, 1984 Lando, 1986 Mt. Bethel-Porters Chapel, 1989 Mt. Olive-Pleasant Grove, 1992 North-Limestone, 1998 Aldersgate-Inman, and 2000 Emory-Nazareth. He retired in 2004.

He also served on the Conference Board of Education 1972-1977, Commission on Status and Role of Women 1978-1992, Trustee for Epworth Children's Home 1980-1988, Orangeburg Wesley Foundation Director 1996-2001, and Chair of Orangeburg Wesley Foundation 1999-2001.

During his lifetime he worked with and mentored many troubled youth and at Epworth he met a young man whom he adopted as his son.

Upon his retirement he moved to The Methodist Oaks in Orangeburg where he spent most of his remaining years. He loved life at The Oaks and was actively involved in many campus activities. He served on the Board of Directors for 8 years and was actively involved with the Christmas Fund for employees.

He attended St. Paul's UMC in Orangeburg until 2013 when he became a mentor to Rev. Sandra Whetsell at New Hope UMC in Rowesville where he attended every service and guided



both Rev. Whetsell and the congregation in the *Discipline* of the UMC. He and Rev. Whetsell became close friends for the remainder of his days. She said, "He was a wonderful, wonderful kind Christian man. He knew the Lord and the Lord knew him."

In 2016 his health had declined due to a stroke and he was no longer able to adequately care for himself. He was taken to Saluda to the home of his adopted son, daughter-in-law, and two granddaughters to be cared for. And it was there, 11 months later, that he met his untimely and horrific death at the hands of this family.

Other survivors include his sister, Mary Lowder of Sumter, nieces Maryanne Lowder, Martha Sturgeon, Ruth Hedrick, nephews Bobby Lowder, Tom Lowder, Dave Beaver, and Hugh Chewning, one aunt and a number of cousins. He was preceded in death by a nephew, Scott Lowder.

### **WILLIAM "BILL" KELLY CROSS III**

**February 7, 1935 – October 18, 2017**



William Kelly Cross III (Bill) was born February 7, 1935 in Cross, SC and grew up in that small family community of the low country. He was the first of 5 children (brothers: Andrew, Kenny, Capers, and sister: Sally Barrett). He attended school in Cross and participated in sports, clubs, and drove a school bus. He attended Friendship UMC while there.

He graduated from The Citadel with a passion for physics and science and was introduced to his roommate's sister from Sullivan's Island, Patricia Jenkins (Pat). They were married August 10, 1956. Bill attended Duke Divinity School and went into United Methodist ministry, licensed to preach in 1957, later ordained deacon in 1959, then as an elder in 1960.

His pastoral journey began across South Carolina in Kingstree, SC, then to Blacksburg at St. John's UMC, to York at both King's Mountain Chapel and New Zion. Next, he went to Lancaster and served Hopewell UMC, then to Greer at both Liberty Hill UMC and Ebenezer UMC. He next served Duncan UMC, then moved to the Rock Hill district, serving Bethel UMC and after that, Van Wyck UMC jointly with Catawba UMC. He finished out his charge at Armenia UMC in Chester.

He and Pat served together, building a family of 2 girls and 2 boys over the course of their itinerary (Kim, Tracy, Gary, and Scott). Bill was a great father and managed to put all 4 children through college. In his retirement years, Bill enjoyed 6 grandchildren. He enjoyed photography and videography with the family and made videos and DVD's for friends and family.

He adored the music of the 1960's and 70's and used many a Simon and Garfunkel, Beatles, or Neil Diamond song, to name a few, to illustrate some of his messages from the pulpit. He believed in equal opportunity, forgiveness, and helping those in poverty.

He used his skills in electronics to install sound equipment: PA systems and stereo systems, built speaker boxes, worked at Radio Shack, and led the videography and PA systems for many of the Annual United Methodist Conferences over the years. The best MYF parties were at the Cross parsonage! He had great strengths in youth ministries and enjoyed church softball. He enjoyed playing Chess, Scrabble, and card games; quite often he and Pat played Bridge with fellow pastors or church members. He and Pat enjoyed watching sports together: particularly Duke basketball.

After Pat suddenly passed away in 2015, it was a short path to his decline and passing. They were married for 59 years. They relished family time together in their last years delighting in celebrating birthdays and holidays with their children and grandchildren. Bill lost his battle to prostate cancer on October 18, 2017. He will be missed.

### **JAMES SOLOMON GADSDEN, SR.**

**June 12, 1930 – June 19, 2017**

James Solomon Gadsden, Sr., (affectionately known as Jim by many), was the ninth child born to William and Rosa Lee Rollerson Gadsden (both deceased). A native of Berkeley County, S.C., he was a high school graduate of Boylan-Haven Mather Academy in Camden, S.C. where he was in the top ten of his class. A bright scholar and leader, Jim earned an A.B. degree from Claflin College (now University) in Orangeburg, S.C. (1954), was class president for four years, and graduated summa cum laude in History and Religious Studies. At Gammon

Theological Seminary, Atlanta, GA, where he earned a Master's of Divinity degree (1957), he was third in his graduating class, received the Smith-Taylor Award for writing and academic growth, and was a member of the National Honor Society of Alpha Kappa Mu. In 1982, the Interdenominational Theological Center of Atlanta, awarded him the Doctor of Divinity degree.

Licensed to preach in 1948 in the Berkeley District on the recommendation of Bethel Church in St. Stephens, S.C., Jim was ordained an elder in 1957, and became a ministerial member of the South Carolina United Methodist Annual Conference where he served numerous appointments including: Associate Editor of Youth Publications at the Board of Discipleship and United Methodist Publishing House in Nashville, TN (1967-1978); Greenwood District Superintendent in Greenwood, SC (1978-1984), and the Conference Council Director of the S.C. Annual Conference (1985-1989).



As a pastor, he served appointments at Walterboro (1952), Summerville (1953), West Anderson Charge (1954-1957), Lamar (1957-1958), Sumter (1959), Camden (1960-1966), Florence (1989-1990), and two congregations in Columbia [Virginia Wingard Memorial (1990-1993) and Wesley United Methodist (1993-1996)]. In 1990 Jim was named senior pastor of Virginia Wingard Memorial-an 800 member predominantly white United Methodist congregation. He was one of a select group of five pastors across the U.S. who were asked to cross the Sunday morning racial divide and lead a congregation of a different race or ethnicity, which he did for three years.

Throughout his ministry, Jim experienced his share of being a trailblazer. In addition to his Virginia Wingard appointment, he served as *the first black*: editor of Youth Publications at the United Methodist Publishing House, district superintendent of the Greenwood District, Associate Council Director, and later Council Director of the S.C. Annual Conference.

In addition to his congregational ministry, Jim was an author and editor. He authored two books "*Can Blacks Be Christian?*" and "*Black Pilgrimage in America: The Christian Perspective and Experiences*". He also edited publications such as "*Struggles and Hopes of the Black Church*", "*Explore*", and "*Confirming My Faith*" (the official confirmation resources for the United Methodist Church).

For 44 years Jim's dedication to ministry and service were evident as a congregational pastor, supervisor and evaluator of pastors, and as a leader and member of numerous local and national organizations. He served on the board of directors of Hinton Rural Life, the S.C. United Methodist Foundation, the S.C. Region Department of Mental Retardation, Claflin University, the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, and many others. He was a supporter of Oliver Gospel Mission, as well as a long-time member of Rotary International. Throughout his ministry, Jim received numerous awards and recognition for his work, including the honor of being selected as a delegate to the denomination's General Conference and Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference in 1980, 1984, 1988, and 1992.

Jim retired from active ministry in 1996, but continued to preach and teach occasionally, and lead by example daily. He was known for his caring and loving spirit, and astute counsel.

Through school, the church, and the community, Jim made a lifetime of friends and acquaintances. Although a great storyteller and listener, it was Jim's quiet demeanor, friendly smile, easy laugh, and unwavering faith that live on in the memory of those he influenced, and those that loved him.

A devoted husband to Thelma Curtis (deceased), he was also a nurturing and loving father of four children: James Jr., Cynthia, Jessica, and Curtis, and the proud grandfather of Andrea. Jim was also the loving brother of Elouise Middleton (deceased), Evelyn Williams, Alice Rosa Lee Perkins (deceased), Matilda Gadsden, Martha Gant (Warren), Estelle Sellers, and William Gadsden. In addition, he leaves a large extended family of loved ones, including many nephews, nieces, cousins, and a host of friends and colleagues.

#### **WILLIAM MURRAY GIBBONS**

**January 3, 1933 – April 1, 2018**

Rev. William Murray Gibbons was born January 3, 1933, in New Zion, South Carolina, son of William Levi Gibbons and Annie Lou DuBose Gibbons. He grew up on his family's small farm there in Clarendon County.

He graduated from Wofford College in Spartanburg, South Carolina, in 1955, with a B.A., and received his Bachelor of Divinity and Masters of Divinity at Candler School of Theology, Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia, PM 1956, FE 1958.



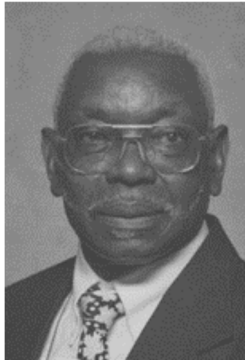
Licensed to preach April 27, 1956, Florence, District, SC Conference, Ordained Deacon August 15, 1958, and Elder June 23, 1960 both by Bishop Nolan B. Harmon, Florence District, SC Conference.

Rev. Gibbons was the founder of Trinity United Church in Conway, South Carolina in 1958. He transferred from the South Carolina Conference to the California Pacific Conference in 1961. He served as Associate Pastor at First Methodist Church at Redondo Beach, California, Dominquez Community Methodist Church, Long Beach, California, Granado Park UMC, Alhambra, California, First UMC Lompoc, Lompoc, California, Yorba Linda UMC, Yorba Linda, California, North Glendale UMC, Glendale, California. And University UMC, Irvine, California. In 1992, he transferred from the California Pacific Conference back to SC Conference and served Upper Richard (Oak Grove UMC and Beulah UMC) Blythewood, SC.

Rev. Gibbons retired in 1999 having served 43 years in the United Methodist Church.

#### **L. JUNIOR GRAHAM**

**August 5, 1932 – August 27, 2017**



Weak was his body but not his faith. "Don't worry about me. My name is written in the Lamb Book of Life," were the words he told everyone who visited with him in the last days preceding his death. Reverend L. Junior Graham answered the call and entered eternal rest on Sunday, August 27, 2017. Known to many as "Bubba Graham," Rev. Graham was the son of Viola Salters and Rev. Jacob Session. He was reared in the home of his grandparents Mr. Willie and Mary Graham, all of whom preceded him in death.

Rev. Graham became a soldier on the battle field for the Lord at an early age. After working all day and traveling many nights and weekends, he obtained his Associate Degree from Morris College of Sumter, South Carolina and his Seminary Degree from Emory University of Atlanta, Georgia. Rev. Graham received his first ministerial appointment in 1970 to the Jefferson Parish in Hartsville that required him to travel over 130 miles one way. He was committed and dedicated to meeting the needs of that congregation and community. He later served the Maryville Charge in the Charleston district which brought him closer to home. There were three small churches that made up the Eadytown Charge that Rev. Graham was later appointed to. The churches of the Eadytown charge merged, built a new edifice and formed what is known as Mt. Nebo United Methodist Church. During his tenure, Rev. Graham and the Mt. Nebo family celebrated the burning of mortgage. He served as the shepherd of that flock for 26 years.

Rev. Graham retired from the United Methodist Conference in 2002. Although he retired from pastoring, he didn't retire from preaching and teaching. He reestablished ties with his home church, Asbury, where he joined the senior choir, led bible study and challenged members to take a closer look at their "life-living". He continued to preach whenever the opportunity presented itself and assisted the pastors by doing whatever they requested. He was active in many organizations including the Joseph and Brothers Lodge, Masonic Lodge 409 and served as chaplain for McKnight-Fraser funeral home.

Rev. Graham leaned on God's Word and others leaned on him. Many looked up to him. As a pillar in the community, he did whatever he could to help. He was the "go-to" person for many and they constantly relied on him. He was a listening ear and an open wallet to anyone who needed assistance. He shared his beliefs to all. There was never a question about his position. He told you do the right thing and "get right with God". Rev. Graham dearly loved his family and his church. He enjoyed spending time on his tractor and taking care of his farm.

Rev. Graham is survived by his spouse of 63 years, Bernetha Morris Graham, his sons and daughters, Minister Jimmie (Lorraine) Graham, Ronnie Graham of Andrews, SC, Lorgean Graham, Kenneth Graham of Hopkins, SC, Sandral (Albert) Jackson of Orangeburg, SC and Rev. Curnell (Amy) Graham of Dublin, Ohio; his siblings, Wearlean Chandler, Lorine (Raymond) Cooper, Alafair Grayson, Charles (Doris) Session of Andrews, SC, Joan Session, Rochester, NY and Elijah (Estell Tina) Session of Baltimore, MD, Sister-in-laws: Roberta Salters of Rochester, NY, Lucille Graham, Marva Sessions both of Andrews, SC, Mattie Alston

**JAMES ALLEN GRIGSBY, SR.**

**September 10, 1920 – November 5, 2017**

Rev. Jim Grigsby passed away peacefully Sunday November 5, 2017, in Fredericksburg, VA, shortly after frequent visits from his family. Born September 10, 1920, at the old Grigsby family home in rural Saluda County, Jim was the sixth child (of seven children) from Ada Lester and Jacob Levi Grigsby.

A service was held to celebrate Rev. Grigsby's life on November 11, at Emory United Methodist Church with the Rev. John Bauknight officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery.

Rev. Grigsby is survived by two sons Jim and Tom and their wives, nine grandchildren, and three great grandchildren. He was pre-deceased by a third son John, his wife (Esmer) Delle Johnson Grigsby; and also his mother, father and six siblings.

Sometime after starting a farming career in his early twenties, Rev. Grigsby accepted a call to become a minister. He attended Wofford College during World War II where he was serving five churches by the time of his graduation, and afterwards completed his Masters of Divinity at Emory University, and was subsequently ordained by the South Carolina Methodist Conference. Rev. Grigsby served the following appointments: 1947 Laurens-St. James, 1953 Marshal Memorial-Homeland Park, 1956 West Columbia-Mt. Hebron, 1959 Lewis Memorial, 1962 Glendale, 1965 Orange Circuit, 1971 Kershaw Charge, 1975 Rock Hill-Bethel, 1978 Pine Grove-Epworth, 1983 Grace-Bethel Charge, 1984 Grover, 1994 Ridge Spring (RSY)

Like some professions, other ministers and their families are the only ones that are likely to know and understand the selfless service and sacrifices that are rendered in a typical career. Rev. Grigsby touched countless lives by his service and the example he set for others to follow. He never claimed perfection and every day was meant for service. Except for the last ten years of his life when dementia claimed his better sensibilities, he never stopped giving to others.

Rev. Grigsby retired from the South Carolina Methodist Conference in 1986, to the family farm, and later became the pastor of Ridge Spring UMC in 1994. In retirement, he and his wife Delle faithfully attended Emory, the church of his childhood and participated in many programs there. He has resided in assisted care living near his oldest son in Fredericksburg since 2012.



**EUGENE J. HARPER**

**August 7, 1928 – October 25, 2017**

The Reverend Eugene James Harper went home to his Lord and Savior Jesus Christ on October 25, 2017 at the age of 89. He was a loving Father to his three surviving children: His daughter, Kathryn H. Harrell and her husband Hubert, of Pinopolis; two sons, Donald E. Harper and his wife, Liz, of Pinopolis, and Matthew Harper and his wife, Annie, of Lexington. He is also survived by nine grandchildren, nine great grandchildren, and five great-great grandchildren.

Gene, as he was known to most, graduated from Wofford College, and continued his education, studying seminary at Duke University. He served several churches while he continued his education, and ultimately ended up as Assistant Director for the Department of Mental Health at Morris Village. Following retirement from the state, he pursued many paths servicing the community and the Methodist church. 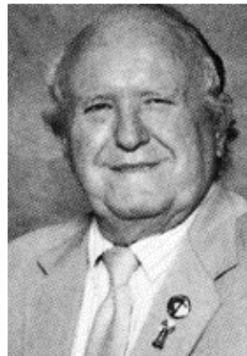

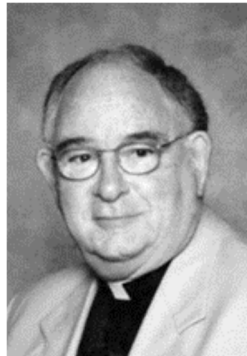

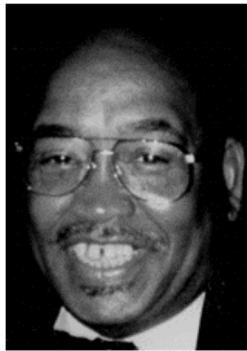
Startex, and Pinopolis. He retired in 1998. In retirement, he worked at Moncks Corner UMC until 2008 as the Director of Adult Ministries.

She was predeceased by her parents, two brothers; Carl Hilliard Bonner and Benjamin Allen Price.

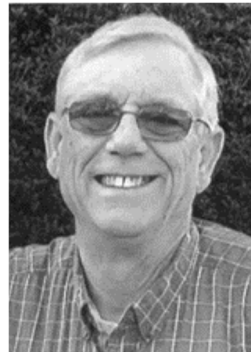
### **JOHN DANIEL "DANNY" SUMMEY**

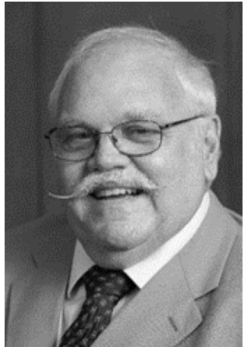
Barbara never let those who were important to her doubt how much they meant to her. Holidays, particularly Christmas, were her favorite times of the year, and she loved to share with others at those times.
