ACTIVE MINISTERS

ROBERT CHRISTOPHER BARRETT December 15, 1973 — February 24, 2016



The Reverend Robert Christopher Barrett was born on December 15, 1973 to the Reverend Doctor Charles David Barrett and Mrs. Sally Cross Barrett of Spartanburg, SC. A recent resident of New Palestine, IN, Reverend Barrett, whom most of his parishioners lovingly knew as "Pastor Chris," lived most of his life in his native South Carolina, where he attended Boiling Springs High School and Wofford College. He received his Masters of Divinity from Duke Divinity School, where he met his wife, Elise Erikson Barrett. After graduating from Duke, Chris served United Methodist churches across the state, including St. John's UMC, Blacksburg, Sardis UMC, Gaffney, Manning UMC, St. Andrews Parish UMC in Charleston, and St. James UMC, Spartanburg.

While at Wofford, Reverend Barrett was named the Presidential Scholar, an honor conferred to the student deemed Most Likely to Benefit Humankind. He used the opportunity to travel to fourteen countries to study the role of the church in the

developing world. His passion for the church led him to serve creatively and faithfully in individual congregations, in the South Carolina United Methodist Conference, and in numerous international mission projects. His most treasured mission work occurred in Peru, where he traveled frequently to support the work of a local seminary. Reverend Barrett was a fourth generation United Methodist minister, and he enriched the lives of many with his warm pastoral caring.

During his 42 years, Reverend Barrett traveled to 38 countries and as many states. No matter where he was, he distinguished himself for his infectious laugh and joyful service to others. He participated in Salkehatchie regularly from the time he was a high schooler, and counted his experiences at those early camps as critical in his understanding of his call to serve. While still a student himself, he organized college students to spend spring break working on hurricane relief after Hugo.

Throughout his entire career, he built wheelchair ramps and roofed houses with equal enthusiasm, and with the hopes that God's love would indeed be made visible in those acts of caring service.

Chris had a supple mind and loved discovering deep connections in his reading of scripture; at the same time, no one was fonder of a good, corny preacher joke to go along with the profound exegetical insights. He had a deep commitment to the lives of young people, working over a period of years to create a custom confirmation curriculum and accompanying many young saints on various retreats and trips. He was optimistic and creative in leadership, a good listener and mentor, and a caring shepherd. During his nearly four-year battle with lymphoma, he inspired hundreds of people by writing of his experience and sharing the lessons of faith that arose from his illness.

He was a devoted husband to his wife, Elise, of New Palestine, IN, and a loving father to his three children, Emma Ruth, Margaret Elisabeth, and Robert Erikson Barrett. He is survived by his parents, Charles David Barrett and Sally Cross Barrett of Spartanburg, SC; his mother- and father-in-law, Meg and Paul Niehaus; and his sister, Sandra Barrett Moore of Lexington, SC; brothers-in-law Thomas George Moore, Jr., James Erikson, and John Niehaus; and sisters-in-law Ashley Erikson and Taryn Niehaus. He will be dearly missed by his loved ones and friends, for he was a gift to all who knew him.

EDWINA JULIETTE WILLIAMS May 25, 1949 – February 14, 2016 Life and Legacy

Edwina Juliette Williams was the elder daughter of the late Captain Edward Julius Williams (Tuskegee Air Force Pilot) and Mrs. Geneva B. Williams. In keeping with a family tradition of quiet social activism, she volunteered to be one of a very small group of African American students to integrate Orangeburg High School in the 1960's. After graduating from OHS, she continued this peaceful resistance movement and helped to integrate Columbia

College which at that time was an all-white women's institution of higher education. She followed in her Mother's footsteps and majored in music with an organ concentration at CC. As a staunch believer in life-long learning, she combined her interest in young people, social service and theology and received three post-graduate degrees: school counseling, Masters of Divinity and a Ph.D. in philosophy and theology.

Edwina was an avid reader of biographies/autobiographies, motivational/self-help, murder mysteries, period pieces and current events. She humorously boasted about reading more than two different genres simultaneously because she found the variety of material quite stimulating and challenging. She always had at least one book by her bedside, another book in the family den and still another in her purse. More importantly, Edwina used her passion for books and exploring the world through print to teach others, lead and participate in literacy classes with the Literacy Society. She



spoke often of her voluntéer work with the Orangeburg Public Library and felt very proud to be recognized for her commitment.

Edwina also had a great appreciation for arts and culture, particularly cultural expressions from the African diaspora. Not only was she very knowledgeable about African American history, she was just shy of being an expert on contributions and accomplishments of noted and not so noted people who made advancements for and because of their race. She was able to travel to Africa visiting various villages and exchanging stories and images of black people's struggles in the USA. On her first trip, she joined a delegation of progressive women committed to changing the status and opportunities for women internationally. She actively participated in grass roots movements while in East Africa promoting education, health care, and better human rights for women and children. During her second trip to West Africa, she joined an organized group of musicians, artists and writers from New York City to provide a cultural exchange forum between the USA and West Africa.

Edwina was able to think globally but act locally. She participated in many voter registration events sponsored by the NAACP and many political gatherings in South Carolina promoting equal and civil rights. She was very active with the local VFW and was a charter member of the Purple Heart Association. She was ardent about civic and social responsibilities and wanted to show unwavering respect and admiration for veterans also. Edwina was appointed by the former SC Governor to serve as one of two Orangeburg individuals on a state wide task force tackling chronic kidney disease and its implications for the residents of the state. Edwina was recommended for her unique perspective as a woman of color and her struggles with renal failure prior to receiving a successful kidney transplant.

As a trained musician, she not only played the organ at her local church, Trinity United Methodist, but also was the musician at other local churches, events and activities. She loved to sing and sang in her church choir throughout her life: the children's choir, the youth choirs and the young adult ensemble. She molded her musical talent to assist other young people learn to play musical instruments and fondly became identified as "the piano teacher." Due to creative and business acumen, she began a modest entrepreneurial endeavor as a musician.

Edwina was very loquacious; she liked to talk, debate issues, and speak publicly. While in elementary school at Christ the King, the Catholic nuns frequently referred to her as "mouth almighty and tongue everlasting." This neither deterred Edwina, dampened her confidence nor curtailed her verbal tenacity. Instead she made up a musical jingle using the nuns' phrase initially but with more maturity, she made a more appropriate use of her spoken dexterity by becoming a lay speaker with the United Methodist Church. She also used her verbal skills teaching religious studies at Orangeburg Calhoun Technical College, providing leadership in the American Business Women's Association, the United Methodist Women and working on various committees and events with her beloved sorority, Delta Sigma Theta. She was also an ordained minister of the South Carolina United Methodist Conference.

Edwina enjoyed keeping up with her friends and associates from childhood, high school and throughout her young adult years. She genuinely felt close and connected to all of them, remembering very detailed information about their successes and their triumphs. She was also very supportive during times of disappointment and distress. Edwina was an optimistic person and wanted people to have joy in their lives.

Edwina loved and was loved by her family. She followed many traditions and became a member of the Eastern Star as her maternal grandmother and mother had done. She was a terrific "older sister," teaching her younger sibling, Cherryetta, to play various board and card games, read, and dance. She gave sisterly advice (solicited and unsolicited) on "matters of the heart," strategies to be more direct, organized and precise in daily living, and how to be spiritually grounded, financially secure and logical in thinking. Edwina enjoyed discussing current events and interrogated her brother-in law about Haiti and global affairs. She was

always curious about situations and circumstances and found talking openly to be self-soothing and enlightening. She maintained her family connections with her many aunts, uncles and cousins, remembering and acknowledging birthdays, anniversaries as well as attending family gatherings and celebrations. Edwina was very close to her Mother and they shared many years of living together laughing, enjoying dinner outings, travel, entertaining visitors and friends in the family home, and attending social, civic and religious events. Edwina was giving and extremely generous to her Mother whom she admired, respected and adored. She will be missed physically, but her life and legacy of love, service, good works, talents and sense of humor will be remembered.

EUGENE HOLLAND BEDENBAUGH

June 4, 1935 - February 16, 2016



The Reverend Eugene "Gene" Holland Bedenbaugh who was born on June 4, 1935 in Newberry County passed peacefully in his home in Easley, South Carolina on February 16, 2016 with his family by his side. He and his wife of fifty-seven years, Mary Helen Jackson Bedenbaugh, had three children Debbie Dawkins, Nancy Hughes and Janet Keen.

After Gene graduated from Britton's Neck high school in 1953 he earned a degree from Columbia Commercial College. He continued his education at the University of South Carolina where he earned a BA degree. It was during his years in college that he met Mary Helen Jackson at Main Street United Methodist Church in Columbia. He married Mary Helen in 1958 and began his career in ministry at Grace United Methodist Church in North Augusta, SC. After several years, he decided to continue his education and moved to Atlanta to attend Emory University. He graduated from Emory with a Master's degree in Christian Education in 1961 and became an Elder in the United Methodist Church in 1970.

Gene served at Main Street United Methodist in Greenwood, SC for four years before moving to Trinity United Methodist Church where he served for sixteen years as one of the only Ministers of Christian Education in South Carolina. During a time when Ministry of Education was groundbreaking, Gene embraced the challenge with enthusiasm for the Lord. Gene impacted lives of youth and adults by not only teaching them about Jesus but offering opportunities for Christian travels. He became well known throughout South Carolina for his yearly trips. It was his passion and joy to take those who couldn't travel on their own to see all of the U.S. and Canada concentrating on the natural world of God. On these trips, he started every day singing, "This is the Day that the Lord has made. Let us rejoice and be glad in it" followed by a devotional and prayer. Gene later served on staff at Berea UMC and Northside UMC in the Greenville area before settling in at Lauren's Road UMC as head pastor for seventeen years. When Gene retired from his beloved Lauren's Road UMC in 2000 they awarded him Pastor Emeritus.

Gene never sought accolades but left a different kind of legacy. Gene could have been a very successful businessman displaying a gift for finance and organization but he chose instead to love God's children and be a servant of the Lord. His offering was his mark on the lives of those he touched. He was a child of mercy and grace that reveled not in his own successes but gave God the glory at every opportunity. He was a self-effacing man who never put on airs; a man among men who related well to everyone as a brother and friend. As one pastoral friend put it upon Gene's passing, "I have lost a very special friend. He was unique in so many ways; a dedicated person of God and a jovial, loving, caring Christian, a sincere brother in the faith". Dad was born in Ludlow, Massachusetts and actually left behind a "book of his life". In the book, were his thoughts and events that took place his entire life. As a small boy, I remember Dad taking in a family that needed food when he served in Florence SC and his acts of kindness were always abound for those he met. He served in the Conference in Greenville: Mountain View, Laurens Road, Berea Friendship; Florence: St Paul; Camden: Lyttleton Street; Columbia: Main Street; Lancaster: St. Luke and retiring in Whitmire SC.

She attended Troy State and received a Master's Degree in Christion Education from Emory University in 1956 and a Master's Degree in Education from the University of Oregon. Betty continued to pursue her love of learning with studies at Appalachian State, the Iliff School of Theology, Scarritt College and the Summer Institute on Christian-Marxist Dialogue in Graz, Austria. She became a Diaconal Minister and then was fully ordained as a deacon.

FRANKLIN HERMAN JOHNSON August 2, 1934 – December 22, 2015

Dr. Rev. Franklin Herman Johnson was a retired member of the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. He served various pastoral appointments and his last was Associate Pastor of Centenary UMC in Charleston.

He received his Master of Divinity degree from Hood Theological Seminary in Salisbury, NC and was awarded the honorary Doctor of Divinity from School of Religion and Metaphysics in New York City.

He served on the following committees: Conference Council on Ministries, Evangelism; Camden Mayor's Blue Ribbon Committee on Drugs and served as President of Kershaw County Black Caucus.



Dr. Johnson is survived by his wife, Elizabeth C. Johnson and four daughters who are Rev. Chenita Frierson, Venita Wilson, Frankye Johnson, and Vanessa Curry.

WILLIAM RANDOLPH KINNETT May 2, 1927 – August 14, 2015

The Reverend William Randolph "Bill" Kinnett joined the Church Triumphant on August 14, 2015. He was eighty-eight years old. "Bill" was born May 2, 1927, in Plum Branch, South Carolina, the son of Paul and Ollie Lee Powell Kinnett. He was a graduate of Spartanburg Methodist College and Furman University. His seminary training was at Emory University's



Candler School of Theology receiving his Emory degree in 1951.

Bill was admitted On Trial in the South Carolina Conference in 1948 and received into Full Connection in 1952. His service as pastor to churches in the South Carolina Conference began as early as 1946. He served fourteen appointments in the South Carolina Conference among them, Mountain View-Few's Chapel; Bethany, Summerville; Clemson; Bethel, Chester; Cayce; Trinity, Greenville, and First Church, Lancaster. He served as Superintendent of the Marion District (1976-1982) under Bishops Edward L. Tullis and Roy C. Clark.

Bill was one of the prominent and outstanding leaders of the South Carolina Conference throughout a long career. He served on many conference boards and committees and had a keen insight into conference matters. Many sought out his counsel and advice. I had the privilege of succeeding him as Registrar of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry in 1984 and always found him a helpful advisor and supportive colleague.

Bill was always very pensive and insightful. He would not be the first to speak on any matter; but when he did speak, generally everyone listened knowing the thought he had put into what he wanted to say. As a member of the Cabinet, he is credited with developing the "board" as a way to organize appointment-making in the conference. This was the beginning of the expression in the South Carolina Conference of "being on the board" which indicated a move.

His last appointment was as Associate at Washington Street, Columbia. When hurricane Hugo swept into and through South Carolina in September, 1989, the conference asked Washington Street to allow him a leave from his duties there to serve as Coordinator of Disaster Relief for the Conference. He was considered one of the most knowledgeable persons in the conference for this task to which he gave effective leadership for many months. He retired in 1991 but continued to participate actively in Washington Street Church where his Memorial Service was held August 17, 2015, under the leadership of the Reverend Drs. William R. Childs and Paul W. Harmon.

He is survived by his wife of sixty-five years, Mary Alice McLaughlin Kinnett, and four children, Lee Frances Kinnett Newman, Paul McLaughlin Kinnett, Robert Forest Kinnett, and Mary Alice Kinnett Roberts. He was preceded in death by his parents and a son, William Randolph Kinnett, Jr.

As a teenager, he often led prayers and devotions at church. He was a positive example and good role model for his peers at church, school, and in the community. George was joined in holy matrimony to Betty Middleton. In the mid 1970's he accepted God's calling to the ministry which challenged him to follow his heart on a spiritual journey. He did so with his wife and children by his side.

During the last 2½ years of his life, George dwelt with many medical issues but they did not deter him from mentoring to anyone. Whenever circumstances allowed him, his wife packed up his wheelchair and drove him to churches (far and near), District

Meetings, the Annual South Carolina UM Annual Conference as well as family events.

George was a minister for over 40 years but pastored under the South Carolina Annual Conference for 36 years. In preparation for the ministry, he earned his Bachelor's degree from Claflin University, Orangeburg, South Carolina; he earned his Masters of Divinity from Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Georgia, and later his Doctor of Minister from Drew University in Madison, New Jersey.

Under the leadership of Bishop Edward Tullis, he was appointed to minister the following parishes: Edisto Fork Parish Orangeburg, SC; St James Parrish, York, SC; Bamberg Circuit,

Bamberg, SC; and The Greer Circuit, Greer, SC. Under the leadership of Bishop Roy C. Clark, he was appointed to minister the Lake City Parish, Lake City, SC. FRED M. REESE, JR. September 18, 1927 – April 16, 2016

Rev. Fred M. Reese, Jr., was born in Tennessee, grew up in Atlanta and Columbia, served in the U.S. Navy, graduated from the University of South Carolina, earned a master's degree from Vanderbilt Divinity School, and was awarded an honorary doctorate from Claflin College. He was awarded fellowships to study at Harvard University in 1954 and 1970. For over four decades, he served as a pastor in the S.C. Conference and retired as a district superintendent in the Florence district. He was heavily involved with civil rights and social justice causes as well as church governance and ecumenical issues. Fred served four years as president of the S.C. Human Relations Council, an organization that focused on addressing racial inequity in the state. He moved from S.C. in 1998 with his wife Dorothy to Linville Falls, N.C., and served a local United Methodist parish for four years.



Bishop Jonathan Holston described Fred as a "trailblazer" who was "ahead of his time on issues of racial reconciliation and

social justice." Indeed, his push for congregations to wrestle with the real issues in their communities sometimes put him at odds with parishioners who were all too comfortable with the status quo. He participated in numerous pulpit exchanges with African-American churches and cultivated connections with clergy from other denominations and faiths. His understanding of the social gospel compelled him to take political stands on racism, capital punishment, war, gender inequity, nuclear proliferation, and poverty.

According to Bishop Lawrence McCleskey, "Fred lived his entire life with an inquisitive and questioning theological mind, never content with over-simplistic and easy answers to the great questions of life and death." His questioning style made him a popular bible study leader and a thoughtful critic of the denomination's polity. He focused much of his critique on the politics of appointments and the perils of an inadequate consultation process.

"Fred had a career-long lover's quarrel with the church. He always expected more of the church than it demonstrated," McCleskey said. His frequent letters to the *Advocate* and appearances at Annual Conference underscored his commitment to strengthening the church and to examining evolving Methodist theology and organizational structure. "He kept at it – the task of reminding us that the church, at its best, is continually in the process of *being* formed – never complete, always in the process of *becoming* what God calls it to be," McCleskey said.

Fred cared deeply for his family, and for over a decade, he devoted himself to caring for his wife of 59 years, Dorothy, as she moved through her lengthy journey with Alzheimer's disease. He selflessly managed her medical and daily needs, kept her engaged in family gatherings and social outings, and made it possible for her to die peacefully at home in 2013.

Fred's style was marked by a "never met a stranger" warmth, a wide smile, and an easy laugh. He delighted in intimate one-on-one conversations and retained names, dates, and details of others' lives far longer than most.

Fred's final letter to the *Advocate* last month pushes leaders at this Annual Conference to avoid settling for easy, "non-controversial" actions and to engage in the challenging work of addressing institutional racism, supporting under-prioritized connectional ministries, addressing the need for equitable clergy compensation, and crafting a mission statement that articulates a socially-relevant direction for the conference. May those who want to honor Fred's life and ministry find the courage to act as visionaries, pioneers, coalition-builders, critics, caretakers, and ministers to all who live in need of advocacy, compassion and love.

DWIGHT MOODY SMITH, JR.

November 20, 1931 - May 10, 2016



D. Moody Smith, Jr., professor emeritus at Duke University Divinity School, died on May 10, 2016. Smith was born in 1931, in Murfreesboro, Tennessee, to Nellie Beckwith and Dwight Moody Smith. He attended public schools in Spartanburg, South Carolina, and graduated from Spartanburg High School in 1950.

Smith received a B.A. in history, summa cum laude, from Davidson College in 1954, where he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and Omicron Delta Kappa. As a candidate for ordained ministry in the Methodist Church, he attended Duke University Divinity School, from which he received a B.D. in 1957.

In that same year, Smith entered the graduate school of Yale University to pursue a Ph.D. in New Testament. He completed this degree in 1961, with a dissertation entitled The Composition and Order of the Fourth Gospel: Bultmann's Literary Theory. This work marked the beginning of a career-long interest in the Johannine literature of the New Testament, about which Smith wrote a

number of books and articles. His most widely read book was Anatomy of the New Testament (1969), co-authored originally with Robert A. Spivey and, beginning with the sixth edition, co-authored also with C. Clifton Black. This book has been in print continuously since publication and is currently in its seventh edition. Notably, Smith also served as editor of a series entitled Studies on Personalities of the New Testament.

Smith's first teaching position was at the Methodist Theological School in Ohio. In 1963, he and his family lived for a year in Zürich, Switzerland, a leave made possible by a Lilly Fellowship. In 1965, Smith moved to Durham, North Carolina, and began his thirty-seven year career as a professor at Duke Divinity School. In 1970, he received a Guggenheim Fellowship, spent the following year at Cambridge University in England, and returned to Duke in 1971.

During his tenure at Duke, Smith served as Associate Dean of the Divinity School, as the Director of Graduate Studies in Religion, and in 1987, he was named the George Washington Ivey Professor of New Testament. Smith taught more than 2,000 divinity students and directed twenty-four Ph.D. dissertations. Among his former students are deans of theological schools, a college president, a bishop of the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church and a past president of the National Council of Churches.

In 1990, Davidson College conferred upon Smith an honorary Doctor of Letters degree, and, in 1993, Duke University named him the Scholar/Teacher of the Year. In 1996, his friends and students presented him a Festschrift, Exploring the Gospel of John in Honor of D. Moody Smith, edited by R. Alan Culpepper and C. Clifton Black. In 1999, Smith served as President of the Society of Biblical Literature, an association of more than 8,000 members in the United States and abroad. He was also a member of the International Society for New Testament Studies and the American Theological Society.

Smith married the former Jane Allen in Spartanburg, South Carolina in 1954, and he is

He is also survived by his four children, Cynthia Smith and her husband, Frank Reiss; Catherine Smith Meynardie and her husband, Robert Meynardie; David B. Smith and his wife, Deborah Camp Smith; and Allen Smith and his partner, Andrew Wilson. Additionally, Smith leaves behind six granddaughters: Hannah Mary Reiss, Juliana Cornwell Avery, Elizabeth Grace Meynardie, Isabella Jane Reiss, Mary Margaret Meynardie and Eleanor Jane Meynardie. His family will remember him for his quick wit, his abidingly kind nature, his passion for tennis, his dedication to social justice and his devotion to his family.


BERNARD ISSAC TIMMONS October 18, 1953 – March 18, 2016
