Conducting a Congregational Survey

Responsibly returning to in-person worship amid an ongoing pandemic requires thoughtful preparation, intentional planning, and the careful implementation of recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Checking the pulse of your local congregation is a vital part of a successful planning process. Often, pastors and church leaders will hear from their most vocal members, but we shouldn't assume that they always represent all perspectives within a congregation.

A first step in accurately gauging your constituency and gleaning the information you need to create your timeline for reopening is conducting a congregational survey. In addition to the helpful data you will collect, a congregational survey:

- Communicates that every voice in your congregation is valued.
- Allows people to **weigh in**, which helps them to **buy in** when plans are unveiled.
- Conveys that thoughtful, intentional planning is taking place.

The sample questions below can be a starting point for your church, but there is no one-size-fits-all survey. Yours should be adapted to capture information pertinent to your local context.

Administering Your Survey

Conducting a survey does not have to be a laborious process. Several tools exist to make gathering congregational data easier. Here are three options:

- <u>Survey Monkey</u> Paid service that might make sense for larger churches. Using the sample questions as a starting point, create your survey using <u>these helpful tutorials</u>.
- <u>Google Forms</u> Free and simple way to create a survey and share it with your congregation. As soon as the results start coming in, you can review them in Google Forms or export them into a spreadsheet and analyze them however you desire. The creator/administrator of the survey will need a Gmail account.

Here is an <u>example of how such a congregational survey</u> could look on Google Forms. When you click on this link, you will be prompted to make a copy of the survey. Once you do that, you can modify it and use it as your own survey.

If you prefer to start from scratch, here are links to step-by-step instructions for creating a survey on <u>your computer</u>, on <u>your iPhone or iPad</u>, or on <u>your Android device</u>.

 Offline Survey – Using the sample questions below as a starting point, create, print and distribute your survey in a way that maintains social distancing in the distribution and collection. In smaller settings, it might be preferable to conduct your survey by phone, with one or more administrators printing and completing the survey based on the answers provided by each person reached by phone.
