¹After this there was a festival of the Jews, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. ²Now in Jerusalem by the Sheep Gate there is a pool, called in Hebrew^[a] Beth-zatha,^[b] which has five porticoes. ³In these lay many ill, blind, lame, and paralyzed people.^[c] ⁵One man was there who had been ill for thirty-eight years. ⁶ When Jesus saw him lying there and knew that he had been there a long time, he said to him, "Do you want to be made well?" ⁷The ill man answered him, "Sir,^[d] I have no one to put me into the pool when the water is stirred up, and while I am making my way someone else steps down ahead of me." ⁸ Jesus said to him, "Stand up, take your mat and walk." ⁹ At once the man was made well, and he took up his mat and began to walk.

Bob Whitesel, the author of the book, *Cure for the Common Church*, writes about God's love for the wholeness and health of the Church. In the passage of above when Jesus sees the ill man at the gate, he asked him the question, "Do you want to be made well?" There are many reasons we find ourselves in circumstances in which we need assistance. We too may be confronted with answering this same question. God wants us to be well, to be whole. When we want to be whole, we have to start with seeing ourselves and listening for God's guidance as we respond with a resounding, "yes Lord!"

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month



Domestic Violence: DIFFICULT TRUTHS

Around 20 women and men per minute are physically abused by an intimate partner in the United States. That equals up to

10 MILLION women and men.

Nearly **2,000** women were murdered by men in 2018 — most commonly with a gun

92% of women killed by men were murdered by someone they knew.

Domestic violence most often comes to our attention when it becomes deadly. In **South Carolina**, the femicide rate (in which a woman is murdered by a man) is often over twice the national average. Apart from 2018 when South Carolina ranked 11th, **in every other year** since VPC began releasing this report in 1998, S.C. has ranked in the top ten states in the nation in the rate of women killed by men. In 2019, South Carolina ranked sixth-worst in the nation for women killed by men. (**Violence Policy Center**)

We know that domestic violence thrives in silence. According to the report, for homicides in which the victim to offender relationship could be identified, 92 percent were murdered by someone they knew with 65 percent being wives, common-law wives, ex-wives or girlfriends.

Among the female intimates who were murdered, 84 percent were killed with guns; 70 percent of these were shot and killed with handguns.
