A SERVICE OF THANKSGIVING AND MEMORY

June 6, 2023, Florence Center

“They Were Sent – And It Was Beautiful”

“Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.”¹⁴ How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them?¹⁵ And how can anyone preach unless they are sent? As it is written: “How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!” (NIV)

Romans 10: 13-15

I like to think that even Paul acknowledged the Methodist system of assigning clergy to their appointed places of service when he wrote, *“How can anyone preach unless they are sent?”* Ours is a sent ministry. I like to tell people that the DNA of our structure is like a missionary sending agency. So when pastors stand before a bishop – as some of us did decades ago and others did night before last – and declare that we are “willing to face any sacrifices that may be involved” in this peculiar life of service, we commit to a pattern of ministry that is both wonderful and terrible. We are introduced to blessings that we could not have imagined, and introduced to burdens and wounds that we would never choose, if we could choose. And this wonderful and terrible life does not encompass only those of us who publicly profess ourselves ready and willing – it also impacts spouses and children.

The word “send” means “to cause or order someone to go and do something”. In a culture that is intensely focused on individual autonomy – the right to decide where and how we will live our lives – this is a strange and unusual thing. To surrender the right to decide where to live. To surrender the right to choose how to spend our weekends - obviously. To surrender ourselves to the authority of a rule of life that is at times in conflict with the communities that we are sent to live in – communities that we did not choose and who did not choose us. All of these spring from the one word, “sent”, and the work that Methodist preachers are sent to do – the work that spouses and families are almost necessarily a part of and always impacted by.

But how could it be otherwise? We are sent out as ambassadors for Christ Jesus, the one who suffered for our sakes. “(H)e was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on him, and by his wounds we are healed.” (Isaiah 53: 5) So we are sent to represent the one who called us to follow him – to share in his work and his sacrifice.

So we do. We follow. We sacrifice. Not literally by dying on a cross – but in many different ways. We surrender the right to respond when criticism comes our way; when resistance develops to visions of ministry. We sacrifice family meals and time together. All of these are real for those who follow as the heirs of Wesley and Asbury. I suspect that every pastor has reached those moments when they are ready to quit, when the burden is heavy, and the opposition runs deep. I suspect that every spouse has had days when they have wondered why they agreed to be part of this journey, to bear both the pain of the person they have married and the pain in their own lives. I suspect that every child has wondered at times why they were chosen to be inserted into a family that they did not choose, to live a life they could not control and so different from those around them. I always thought that I did a good job of balancing my commitment family on the one hand and work on the other until the day when our daughter – who was a teenager at the time – had a dream that on her wedding day I had to go to a church meeting in Columbia before I could be available for her wedding. I’ll let the counselors and therapists in the room take that one apart. When we are honest we cannot avoid the possibility that in some sense the sacrifice in our lives requires sacrifice in the lives around us.

All of this is real – but as real as it is, it is not all. To focus only on the difficulties and the sacrifices of this unique life is to choose to focus on just a part and not the whole. In fact, to focus only on what has been surrendered is to ignore the greater part of this life and all that is born out of it. Because it is in the surrender that amazing and beautiful things happen. Remember that “those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for (the sake of Jesus) will find it.” (Matthew 16: 35)

By their sacrifice and surrender the lives that we gather to celebrate and remember this afternoon were transformed into the means of grace by which God reached into the brokenness of which there is too much in this world – and into the hearts and lives of untold numbers of people desperately seeking to be healed of their pain and saved from their emptiness. Because, *“Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.”*¹⁴ *(But) How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them?*¹⁵ *And how can anyone preach unless they are sent?*

Pastors and spouses are sent and used by God to heal, inspire, teach, support, comfort, and in the end – to bring to faith. Many times it was in public – in sermons preached, lessons taught, confirmation classes welcomed, mid-week meals organized. Maybe it took the form of committee meetings (as distasteful as they may seem) or calendar planning or worship planning. The daily, weekly, yearly work to build up a community of faith which shaped not only the lives invested in it but the larger community that surrounded it.

Sometimes it was in making the Gospel incarnate by working with youth groups, by repairing homes or building entirely new ones, in organizing medical mission trips, by speaking for those who cannot speak for themselves, or in helping those who come to the church when all other sources of help have proven dry.

Perhaps most often it was in private, in pastoral conversations: to hear the cries of pain of body or spirit and speak words of comfort and strength; to listen to the outpouring of confession of sin and guilt and then to speak words of repentance and grace; to visit the lonely; to sit with the grieving; to spend weekends in prisons; to pray for and with those who desperately need God’s touch and yet find themselves unable to speak for themselves.

To paraphrase the retirement service, never think lightly of the great good that God has accomplished through those you love and we honor. But how can it ever be truly measured except by the host of heaven who alone can see it all, who alone can measure its full impact? So much beauty woven quietly into the fabric of the life that we share, beauty that often only God can see. And yet we and our neighbors are still the beneficiaries. For each act of ministry, no matter whether public or private, no matter how large or how small, has opened a window in our world that has allowed the grace of God to enter in.

So rejoice and be glad, because great is their reward in heaven. Rejoice and be glad, because God has wiped every tear from their eyes, and for them there is no more sorrow or pain. And remember, as every name is called, that they were sent, and it was beautiful!

RETIRED BISHOP

MARSHALL L. (JACK) MEADORS, JR. **January 1, 1933 – May 25, 2023**



Our prayers are with the Meadors family as Marshall L. (Jack) Meadors, Jr., a Bishop of the United Methodist Church, died May 25, 2023.

Bishop Meadors was born in Kingstree, SC, January 1, 1933, son of Sarah Lucius and Marshall L. (Jack) Meadors. He was reared in Florence.

He was a graduate of Wofford College (Phi Beta Kappa), and Candler School of Theology, Emory University.

He received honorary degrees from Wofford, Columbia, Rust, Millsaps, and Rocky Mountain Colleges.

He was ordained elder of The United Methodist Church, August 16, 1958. He served Union Church, Stockbridge, GA; the McBee Charge; Trinity, North Myrtle Beach; Berea Friendship, Greenville; First Church, Marion; St. John's, Anderson; the Columbia District; and Buncombe Street, Greenville.

In 1992, he was elected bishop and assigned to the Mississippi area. He retired in 2000.

His civic involvement included membership on the Anderson County District 5 School Board, a position for which he was twice elected in general elections. Governor Richard Riley appointed him to the Joint Legislative Committee on Aging and then to the SC Commission on Aging, which he chaired for five years. Gov. Riley awarded him "The Order of the Palmetto."

He was president of the Mississippi Religious Leadership Conference, an organization of religious leaders who worked to promote tolerance and understanding in diversity.

He was a director of the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women, a director of the General Board of Church and Society, a member of the University Senate, and a trustee of Emory University.

He chaired the Council of Bishop's Initiative on Children and Poverty, 1995-2000.

In 1999 he was a member of the delegation to Belgrade led by the Rev. Jesse Jackson, which secured the release of three American prisoners of war during the NATO bombing.

He and his wife Hannah then led a delegation to Macedonia to visit refugee camps, and to visit Kosovo to assess the war damage in Pristina and the outlying villages.

He was twice arrested for non-violent acts of civil disobedience; once for protesting the Iraq war; again for demanding more humane immigration deportation policies, especially for children.

In retirement he served as Bishop-in-Residence at Candler School of Theology, Emory University; he chaired the Independent Panel for the Review of Child Abuse in Mission Settings of the General Board of Global Ministries; he was a trustee of Wofford College and trustee emeritus of Emory.

He was married to Hannah Campbell who predeceased him.

He is survived by four children: Jane M. Cromley (George) of Pawleys Island, Marshall, III, (Jennifer) of Anderson, James (Anne) of Charleston, and John (Tricia) of Columbia; a sister, Sarah M. (Sissie) Stokes, a niece, Sarah L. (Sallie) Stokes of Murrells Inlet; ten grandchildren: Hannah Cromley, Mary C. Tibbetts (Robert), Parker Cromley, Weatherly, James, Jr., and Jack Meadors, Blakely, Maggie, John, Jr. (Salley), and Perry Meadors; and eight great-grandchildren: Marshall, Henry, Vivianne, Benjamin, James, III, Hayes, Wilder, and Gus.

A memorial service was held at St. John's United Methodist, Anderson, SC, June 9, 2023. The family greeted friends in the Family Activity Center building before the service. The service was held in the sanctuary. A graveside service was held June 10, 2023, at Mount Hope Cemetery, Florence, SC.

CLYDE MAJOR AIKEN July 25, 1933 – May 3, 2023



Clyde was born on July 25, 1933, in Liberty, South Carolina, son of the late Major Duffie Aiken and Eva Elizabeth (Smith) Aiken. Clyde graduated from Liberty High School and then studied at Wofford College.

Upon return home from school, he met and fell in love with his future wife, Mary Ann Stegall ("Ann") of Easley, South Carolina. After he graduated, they married in Easley on November 25, 1955, thus beginning a union that would last almost 68 years and ended only upon his death.

With Ann at his side, Clyde entered the U.S. Army as an Armor Officer and served from 1955 to 1957. Upon discharge, he entered Emory University's Candler School of Theology where he completed his Master of Divinity degree.

Then, Clyde began a second period of military service in the U.S. Army Chaplain Corps, extending from 1962 until his retirement in 1986. He served in Germany, Korea, Dominican Republic, and Vietnam, as well as numerous stateside assignments. His main assignments included Division Chaplain for the 82nd Airborne Division—an assignment he was particularly proud of. His numerous decorations and awards include the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star, and the Senior Parachutist Badge. After 27 years of service and retirement from the Army, Clyde and Ann settled in Columbia, South Carolina where Clyde served two communities as a Methodist Minister for several more years before permanent retirement. He then pursued his hobby as a skilled woodworker and enjoyed traveling, camping, gardening, reading, and visiting his daughter and granddaughter with Ann.

Left to cherish his memory are his wife Ann, daughter Pamela Diane (Aiken) Berman, and granddaughter Rachel Ann (Berman) (Seth) Strickland, all from Harker Heights, Texas, as well as a niece and nephew, Julie (Andrews) Murray and Robert Aiken Andrews from South Carolina.

October 31, 1930 – May 24, 2023

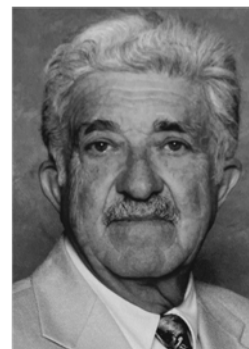
